## **Changing Seasons**



For many of us, the month of September is a time of change and transition, with Summer turning towards Autumn, the conclusion of the holiday season and a return to work; the beginning of a new academic year in school, teenagers packing for university or starting their first job.

Heraclitus, a Greek philosopher, once said 'change is the only constant in life' but despite its regularity, for most of us change is seasoned with both joy and discomfort. Discomfort because the familiar is disrupted, we have to work at new friendships or at learning new things or routines

in a new community, and a 'new normal' has to be found. Change can also be joyous in starting afresh in a place which affords the opportunity to learn and gain new experience or knowledge and make new friends.

Our Christian faith helps us during these times of transition by encouraging us to be thankful for all the good of the past, whilst entrusting our future to God. In the Bible it says,

'Trust God with all your heart; don't try to figure out everything out on your own. Listen for God's voice in everything you do; he's the one who will keep you on track. Don't assume that you know it all. ' (Proverbs 3:5,6)

Whether we feel hopeful for fearful for the future, or perhaps a bit of both, the Bible reminds us to place our trust in God, especially when the future is uncertain. By praying and reflecting on God's word, the Bible, we begin to glean a little more about where God is leading us.

It is this sense of trust amidst anxiety that also features as part of this season of Harvest. Rural communities during harvest time would celebrate and give thanks for the fruit of the land whilst asking God for his blessing for the coming seasons.

Our Harvest services in church are therefore an occasion for us to be thankful for all the good things in life, whilst asking God for his help through life's changes and uncertainties.

Even nature seems to prompt us to be thankful when we can take joy in creation through our gardens, walks along the Strawberry Line or the Mendip Hills.

Pope Francis once wrote, 'We must protect creation for it is a gift which the Lord has given us; we are the guardians of creation. When we exploit creation, we destroy that sign of God's love. Custody of creation is precisely custody of God's gift and it is saying to God: "thank you".

At Harvest time we remember how much of a gift creation is to us and say 'thank you' to God for all the good things that have been a blessing to us, our families, our community over the past year, whilst taking the opportunity to do good towards those who have been less fortunate, and fulfil our role as custodians of creation.

At Harvest time we are also entrusting our future into God's hands, we ask him to help us with life's choices so that they will ultimately work out for the good of not just ourselves, but for those around us.

And as usual, all donations received during our harvest services go to help the foodbanks we support in Weston and Cheddar. So why not come and help us celebrate Harvest this year?

# Winscombe and Sandford Tree Wardens Recent Activities



We are tree-loving volunteers who liaise with North Somerset Council and the Parish Council, as well as with any other interested organisations or individual parishioners.

The current climate emergency and evident global warming and increase in extreme weather incidents have made the welfare of our trees more important than ever. In the ten years since we were formed we have planted trees in various

sites in the parish, including the flats in Sandford Road, in the verges of Homefield Way, in Knapps Close, in the two primary schools, on the Strawberry Line, in Underwood End, Sandford, outside the depot in Hill Road, in Winscombe Recreation Ground, Sandford Children's Playground, Hillyfields Path, in the Community Orchard and behind the public conveniences. We also have been involved in checking the health of trees with TPOs (Tree Preservation Orders) and obtaining new TPOs.

An important aspect of our work is to try to transmit our concern and knowledge to the next generation. Over the last 10 years approximately 600 children from Sandford and Winscombe primary schools have been introduced to trees. Years 5 or 6 have had four sessions each year about trees in each season. Also 120 "Junior Tree Wardens" have been introduced to tree propagation, tree care and responsible planting.

This year we have been busy planting oaks to commemorate the Jubilee – in Winscombe recreation ground, in the new Strongvox estate in Sandford and at the Millennium Green. We have also been watering them, and other trees during this dry summer, as well as checking on the many trees planted in the Strongvox and Redrow estates. Unfortunately we found 18 trees, planted by Strongvox on their newly completed housing estate in Sandford, were dead due to lack of watering, and reported this to the NSC planning enforcement department.

Another concern is how to deal with ash trees suffering from 'Ash Dieback'. We have large numbers of ash trees in the parish, which are gradually becoming infected. Many on the Strawberry Line will have to be felled, and also on the Award Land near Sandford Quarry. The Tree Wardens will not be doing the felling, but we will be involved with the purchase and planting of replacement trees.

Aside from replacing ash trees, there is limited opportunity to plant trees in public spaces, and we would like to encourage local residents to plant trees in their own gardens. We are willing to help and advise anyone who is interested to do this, including providing suitable saplings. As well as the benefits provided by trees in fixing CO<sub>2</sub>, helping to remove pollutants from our atmosphere, attenuating temperature on hot days and providing shelter for wild birds, bats and insects, those of us with trees in their gardens will have appreciated the shade they provide during the sweltering heat we experienced in July and August this year.

An important point, often missed, is that it is better to retain and take care of a healthy and mature tree, which not only contributes hugely to the environment, but also contains a substantial reservoir of stored CO<sub>2</sub>, than to replace it with a sapling which will take many years, if not centuries to mature.

## **Local History Corner**

#### **786 Years and Counting**

St James's Church, Winscombe, was dedicated on 26<sup>th</sup> August 1236, ten years after the first incumbent, William de Kaynesham, was appointed in 1226, seven hundred and ninety six years ago. It seems unlikely that any church building existed at that time although there was probably a chapel on the east side of the courtyard of Winscombe Court. The courtyard has since been totally obscured by later (mostly 19<sup>th</sup> century) building.



The hamlet of Winscombe almost certainly came into existence because there was a plentiful supply of good water from the spring at Eastwell. The manor of Winscombe is noted in the Domesday Book, 1086. It was in existence in 970 and documented as being given by King Edgar to Aelfswith, the wife of a nobleman.

Aelfswith later resided in a nunnery at Winchester. On her death the manor came into the possession of the monks of Glastonbury.

In the 11<sup>th</sup> century with dissent between the church, the crown and the monasteries, Winscombe became traded to the church in return for more independence for the monks of Glastonbury. The manor, therefore, came under the control of the Dean and Chapter of Wells who in 1226 granted it to the bishop, Jocelin, who presumably appointed the first vicar.

Jocelin had been in exile for a period in Rouen during King John's reign and he would have been aware of St Romanus, the patron saint of that cathedral. The new cathedral of Wells was dedicated by Jocelin on 23<sup>rd</sup> October 1226, perhaps not entirely coincidentally on the Feast of St Romanus. It is not a great stretch of the imagination to suppose that Jocelin, when he was given possession of the manor of Winscombe, built a chapel there and he may also have dedicated it to this saint. Records show that in 1331 a hermit was living "in the place commonly called St.Romanus's". There are no dedications to this saint anywhere in the country so it may just be possible that this hermitage was very close to Winscombe Court.

We cannot know the form of the church when it was dedicated in 1236, but generations of worshippers have since developed it into the glorious building of which we can justly be proud. There are two early illustrations of the church from the 16<sup>th</sup> or 17<sup>th</sup> centuries held by the Waldegrave archives, which show it much the same as it is today.

## From The Lynch Chapel

#### A Tribute to John Pockett.

Lynch Chapel has lost one of its most loyal and reliable members, John Pockett, who died at the beginning of August.

He was a man of many parts, a talented artist, a fine musician, a loyal and faithful friend and a committed Christian.

Many readers will have glimpsed his talent as an artist. Think back to the 'Churches Together' Christmas cards which dropped through your doors year by year listing all the Christmas services. The art work, often humorous, was very often produced by John. And it always raised a smile.

John was, of course, our organist, a role which grew over very many years. He tackled whatever hymns, sometimes unfamiliar to us all, the preacher of the day suggested, and sometimes they were a real challenge. He was always available for any other services hosted at the chapel.

He had a great love of music, both classical and jazz. He had a huge CD collection and despite his deafness was able to still enjoy it. He was the glue that held the 'Recorded Music Society' together and those who attended will remember his varied and sometimes esoteric programmes. His programmes always started with a humorous anecdote or comment he had come across in his research. And he really loved the concerts put on by Churchill Music! I'm so grateful that he and Mary introduced me to its various delights.

John was a keen member of Probus and indeed was their registrar. Many of you will remember him in that role.

One of my fondest memories was of him and Mary putting together summer programmes for August Activities (trust him to come up with a good pun) which ran for several years with fun activities for the over 60s and always including a sing song with Jazz as a final flourish. John loved Jazz and Old Time Music Hall. The idea grew out of their joint concern for those who found August a difficult month with most activities closing down. They were very much aware of the need to help others. As such they ran the Sandford equivalent of Contact to ensure people who needed a lift to hospital could be provided for. This meant hours of work ringing round to make a match between client and driver.



John was always a dapper dresser and as someone described him 'One of Nature's True Gentlemen'.


John was still playing the piano for us up until a fortnight before he died. He was also still keeping our books straight, making sure claims were made in a timely fashion.

He was generous and had just bought a beautiful bird bath for our developing Psalm 23 Garden. It will be a wonderful way to remember him each time we go from the carpark to the chapel. We shall miss him so very much, but we

know that he has faithfully trodden the path that was set before him and is now with his God.

# **Johnny Appleseed**



The legend of Johnny Appleseed is based largely on the life of John Chapman. While the story is often considered a tall tale, many parts are true!

He was born in Massachusetts in 1774. As a young man he began an apprenticeship as an orchardist which inspired his life's journey of planting apple trees.

John Chapman really did travel through parts of the United Stated planting apple trees and apple orchards. He carried apple seeds with him in a sack as he travelled across the country. He was usually barefoot and wore threadbare clothing.

Although he was a wandering apple farmer, he did not just randomly plant seeds all over the country. Instead he carefully planned, bought land and cared for the orchards he planted. He put fences around the orchards to protect them from animals and left them in the care

of neighbours and friends.

Johnny Appleseed spent 50 years travelling across many states caring for these orchards. He is known to have travelled and planted trees in Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, and Illinois, West Virginia, as well as Ontario in Canada. Chapman owned around 1,200 acres of valuable land at the time of his death.

The trees that Chapman planted had multiple purposes, although they did not yield edible fruit. The small, tart apples his orchards produced were useful primarily to make hard cider and applejack.

Johnny Appleseed made friends with many people as he travelled and people looked forward to his visits. He was even close with many Native American tribes. They called him the apple seed man, and the Johnny Appleseed nickname did not actually stick until after his death.

Chapman was a follower of the New Church, also known as the Church of Swedenborg. He carried a Bible with him and preached the Gospel to the people wherever he travelled.

Oh, the Lord's been good to me And so I thank the Lord For giving me the things I need, The sun, the rain and the appleseed; Oh, the Lord's been good to me. Oh, and every seed I sow
Will grow into a tree
And someday there'll be apples there
For everyone in the world to share.
Oh, the Lord is good to me.

This event raised about £320 for charities supported by Rotary.



# **Gardening Notes for September**

#### The Ornamental Garden



Continue dead heading penstemons, dahlias and any other late flowering perennials to prolong the flowering period. Keep feeding patio plants and hanging baskets with a high potassium feed such as tomato fertiliser.

Cut privet, yew and leylandii hedges for the last time, giving them chance to recover before winter sets in.

Keep camelias and rhododendrons well watered to ensure good flower bud formation for next year. Plant new flowering perennials now while the soil is still warm and there is plenty of time for plants to root and get established before they become dormant for winter. Make sure they are watered if it's dry and put some mulch around them to protect the new roots

#### **Divide Perennials**

Start to dig up and divide early flowering perennials that have outgrown their space or have become congested. Prepare the soil well before replanting.

#### **Plant Bulbs**





Plant Bulbs in borders, other than tulips which should be planted in October to November. For containers plant bulbs in layers for a succession of Spring colour. Use a container at least 30cm wide and high. Cover the drainage hole with crocks and add some compost. Position late flowering daffodils or tulips

in a circle leaving a bulb sized gap between each one. Cover the first layer of bulbs so the tops are just visible and plant early flowering daffodils in the gaps between the tops of the bulbs below. Repeat the same operation and plant a third layer of bulbs such as crocus or iris reticulata. Top up the container with compost to just below the rim and water well.

#### Lawns

Help lawns to recover from the summer stress. Start by mowing, then scarify the surface with a wire rake, removing any dead material and moss. Improve drainage and relieve compaction by making holes with a fork or hollow tined aeration tool. Finally apply a top dressing, which you can buy ready-made or



mix your own using compost, loam and fine grit. Spread the top-dressing thinly and evenly over the lawn so that it smooths over any dips and falls into the holes

#### The Kitchen Garden

Asparagus: the ferny foliage of asparagus has been growing all the summer, helping to feed the crowns for next year's crop. As soon as the leaves turn yellow, cut down 2-3cm above ground level. Lightly fork over the surrounding soil and add a generous mulch of garden compost.

You will find Branch members "moored" at the exit to Cadbury's Garden Centre with "Rescue Buckets" deployed ready to recover cash that is drowning.

# THE FASTNET RACE DISASTER REMEMBERED – 13th AUGUST 1979

On 11<sup>th</sup> August 1979, 303 yachts set out from Cowes for the Fastnet Race on a 605 mile course to sail to the Fastnet rock off the south coast of Ireland and return to Plymouth. On the night of 13<sup>th</sup> August 1979, a huge Force 11 Storm blew up off Ireland and so began the biggest Sea Rescue Operation since the Second World War. In total, 200 yachts retired, 19 were abandoned and five sank while the rescue operation involved RAF Nimrod aircraft and helicopters, RN Surface ships and helicopters, HM Coastguard and Irish Coastguard staffs, Irish Air Corps aircraft and helicopters, and thirteen RNLI All Weather Lifeboats from four stations in Southern Ireland, Angle in South West Wales and nine stations in Cornwall. That night the RNLI Lifeboats saved 96 lives alone, in addition to those rescued by helicopters. Sadly, fifteen sailors were lost to the sea despite the enormous efforts made by the Coordinated Rescue Organisations.

#### **JULY RESCUES**

In July there were twenty two shouts between our four lifeboat stations (Burnham-on-Sea 2, Minehead 7, Portishead 6 & Weston-super-Mare 7).

At 7:50 pm on Saturday 16<sup>th</sup> July, the Weston RNLI volunteers were paged by HM Coastguard. A fishing boat had suffered engine failure with 2 people on board and was unable to get back on to its mooring. The crew were requested to assist with the recovery of the vessel and return it to Uphill Boatyard. Both lifeboats were launched at 8:15 pm and the Atlantic 85 lifeboat provided the main tow back to Uphill where the D class lifeboat then positioned the casualty vessel safely onto its mooring.

Once the recovery was completed, both lifeboats were returned to the lifeboat station where they were washed, refuelled and made ready for service by 10:00pm.

# "In Quires and Places where they sing...."

...and sing they did! The combined voices St James' Church Choir and The Trinity Singers, in tribute to the late Keith Vigus whose funeral took place last month. Appropriately, the anthem chosen was C.V.Stanford's setting of the Nunc Dimittis in B flat and the hymns, all chosen by the family, included Tallis's Canon and the Old Hundredth. The service in church concluded with the choir singing Orlando Gibbons' 'Drop, Drop Slow Tears'.

Keith Vigus was born in 1936 and grew up in Dursley, Gloucestershire. He joined the choir of the parish church at the tender age of 7 and it was here he discovered his love of music and choral singing which would become a life-long passion. Leaving school he went up to Bristol University to study dentistry. It was through the university choral and operatic societies that he met his future wife Pamela, a student physicist. They became engaged as soon as they graduated. Keith practiced briefly at Gloucester Hospital before taking up a dental practice in Hartcliffe in 1960. He remained an NHS dentist until he retired from practice in 1995. His children once asked him why he did not go into private practice like so many others? He replied that if he were to go private it would rob many people of access to dental treatment in Hartcliffe.

Keith and Pam were married in 1960 in St Marys' Wedmore, moving to what would be their permanent home, in Winscombe, in 1963. They had three children and the elder two joined St James' Church Choir in the early 1970s They thoroughly enjoyed singing and tried to persuade their father to join the choir but Keith initially resisted his children's pleas, claiming he was too busy, but eventually he succumbed and joined in about 1976. It wasn't long before he was asked to take on the role of choirmaster following the sudden death of the existing organist and choirmaster.



Towards the end of the 80s the church's music was reorganised and moved away from the traditional to a more 'charismatic' style of worship—The next incumbent was a keen musician and under Keith's direction the choir flourished. By the end of the decade, it had trebled in size and included many children as shown in the photograph.

The new millennium brought further changes at the vicarage and Keith decided to resign as choirmaster.

However, still enjoyed singing with other choirs especially The Trinity Singers.

He had many other interests including collecting and restoring agricultural machinery - he had a an Armstrong-Whitworth steam roller in the back of his garage! He was a keen gardener, growing many of his own vegetables and also a keen and a very knowledgeable environmentalist. In his later years much of his time was devoted to the care of his wife Pam as dementia gradually overtook her life.

In a simple sense harvest is about receiving; receiving the gifts provided from the fruits of the Earth on which our lives depend for survival. Harvest is also about giving; giving thanks for such wonderful and vital resources to provide us with what we need to live day by day.

But, of course, what we receive through the wonder of harvest does not just happen! Human beings who benefit from harvest have to contribute significantly to growing, pruning, fertilising, collecting and distributing

the produce. We share in the creation as well as in the fruits.

This deep truth should remind us of a number of important factors around receiving and giving:

- each human life is received from the miracle of Creation, and is called to play a part in enabling this creation to produce the fruits that sustain us all: food, fellowship, dreams and hopes.
- we receive guidance in how to fulfil this primary purpose in our lives through the teaching and example of Jesus Christ.
- the key is partnership and participation we are part of one body, with one Head. This is my body: do this in remembrance of me.
- the fact of sin and selfishness means that millions of God's children don't receive a fair share of God's harvest and are left hungry and struggling.

Harvest is the time for giving:

- giving thanks to God for our creation, and for our calling to play a part in the whole of the creation being fruitful.
- giving careful consideration to our failings to work harder for the inclusion of the excluded.
- giving priority to crafting actions which will enable a fairer sharing of the miracle of the harvest.

Harvest is a good time to go to church; let us join others in giving thanks, confessing our failings, and being joined in a universal body that seeks to include all God's children in the sharing of the fruits of the Earth. Give thanks, confess, commit to making a difference and be part of our public witness for Harvest and Giving.
