Advent, Come again?



Advent is generally regarded as a time of a preparation for Christmas but for Christians it is also a time to focus on Jesus' promised second coming. When Jesus speaks in Mark's Gospel of 'suffering, the sun being darkened' etc. he is only echoing several OT writers and their predictions about the Day of The Lord. We should also bear in mind that when Mark was writing his Gospel, the world seemed to be in a very dark place. The Romans had overrun Israel and destroyed The Temple. The Parthians were at war with Rome. There were also natural phenomena such as

earthquakes and volcanic eruptions at the time. No shortage of imagery!

No wonder some early Christians assumed the second coming was imminent. The Christians in Thessalonica even gave up work to wait for what they believed was about to happen – for which they got an earful from St. Paul! Throughout history there has been no shortage of cults predicting the end of the world only to be disappointed.

Speculation

Jesus gave no encouragement to such speculation and on the contrary he warned his hearers off, telling them that no one knows the day or the hour and that it is pointless to speculate. Saying that, He, Jesus, did not know that day or the time. What he did was to remind his disciples that there was much work to be done and they should beware of being caught napping! The parable of the wise and foolish virgins is just one of several instances of warnings by Jesus.

Second or Third Coming?

The twelfth century Abbot, Bernard of Clairvaux suggests there are really three comings: The first when Jesus came in human form, the second when we come to know him through the Holy Spirit and the third when he will come at the end of time.

Death by Culture

Everyone loves Christmas and its associated traditions. It has passed into Western culture. Everyone enjoys the parties, children dressing up as shepherds, the giving of presents, fairy lights, Christmas Trees, singing carols, and so on. For many it is just another fairy story! But the incarnation is about the real, adult Jesus who at the age of 30, (and not as a cuddly baby), came to change the world and usher in the Kingdom of God or the rule of God. A new way of living. The truth is that many have not experienced Christ's coming in any form!

Sleepers Awake

Some years ago I was listening to a Bishop of another diocese talking about his diocesan strategy; a 'Programme for Growth'. He said that he felt much of the church today gives the impression of being sound asleep: asleep to the needs and realities of the world about us. Christian people needed a Wake-up Call! There was a need to rediscover what it means to be a servant church – telling people about Christ, listening to what other people are saying, responding to a community's needs, working in partnership with those who share our values, whist having respect and integrity for others. We do not have to apologise for being Christian and or for holding Christian values in a multi-cultural society. In short being the church but in new ways. I think we too can do with a Wake -up Call. And let's make a start by trying to make the message and the wonder of the incarnation real for everyone in our villages and communities this Advent.

Remembrance Sunday



Services at each of our churches were well attended on Remembrance Sunday as our villages paid their respects to the fallen and the two minute silence was kept at 11 am.

In Sandford people assembled at the memorial to lay wreaths and listen to the names of those who died. At the church the standard was laid on the altar and Sandford Hand Bell Ringers played peals and chimes giving the congregation time to reflect. Poignant displays of poppies and artefacts were a reminder of the role of the Army, Navy and Air Force in conflicts past and present. There were also white and purple poppies representing peace and the contribution of animals.





St James's was decorated, once again, with knitted poppies. The Royal British Legion paraded their flags together with over 40 young people from the various Girl Guiding and Scout sections in Winscombe. The Last Post was played by a young trumpet player, followed by the two minute silence and then Reveille providing a very special atmosphere in the Church. Scouts and Guides also read the names of the fallen. Wreaths from a number of community organisations were laid on the altar before being placed on the War Memorial at the conclusion of the service. A collection in aid of the Royal British Legion raised £242.95

Reverend Warren Williams led the Remembrance Service at St John the Baptist Church, Churchill. It was a moving and reflective service, reminding us of the horrors and long-term effects of conflict based on thoughts written during and after WWI.

'When You Go Home, Tell Them Of Us And Say, For Your Tomorrow, We Gave Our Today.'



"For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace."

Familiar to us through Carol Services and immortalised by Handel, these words of promise and prophecy were spoken by Isaiah,

hundreds of years before they were fulfilled. They promised hope in bleak times, a future better than the present. It must have seemed to the Israelites - a community of people broken apart by international conflict and longing for a sense of identity - that the fulfilment of these words was always beyond reach, like God had forgotten them. Today, with the COVID Pandemic still with us, war in Ukraine, the effects of global warming and most latterly, the cost of living crisis, many today are also deeply anxious about the future and it is hard to believe in a future better than the present.

Even when this prophecy was finally fulfilled in the coming of Jesus Christ as a baby, people had difficulty accepting it, for it was fulfilled in unexpected ways that disturbed expectations and disrupted familiar patterns - the God of all creation confining himself to the form of a human child, familiar with human frailty and suffering. Instead of royalty and palaces, Christ's birthplace is a mere stable. Instead of dignitaries and diplomatic emissaries, lowly shepherds smelling of their flock and fresh from the field, are the ones invited to gather around and share the joy. But this is the wonder and joy of it – that God doesn't work to human expectations or timescale. He is not swayed by wealth or popularity or status, and knows what it's like to live a life of poverty in a time of international conflict. Finally, Wise Men also arrive to see the Christ-child; travelling from far-away places, following a star. This gives us great encouragement, for we know that Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and forever. The same God who came as Christ in Bible times is with us today in our community, through his Holy Spirit.

Amazingly, as we look back over the last year, we can trace God's hand of blessing on our church community. We are together as three churches but one church community, one body of Christ, called by God to serve him. Despite the ongoing (and hopefully diminishing) pandemic, our churches continue to grow.

People have joined us from the new housing estates. Refreshment Breakfasts have restarted and continue, as have our Coffee Mornings at the Centre and Community Cafes at All Saints. Scramblers, our group for parents and toddlers, also continues to grow, as do our six home groups. We continue to celebrate an exciting variety of worship including BCP as well as Café Church and Family Holy Communion. Messy Church has re-started, as has the team taking Collective Worship in our primary schools. In many of our sheltered housing and care homes, we take Holy Communion regularly to share with residents. And it has been great this year to see our friends join us from Ukraine and for a time, have our Asylum Seekers with us in our services.

I want to recognise the endeavour of those who volunteer and help keep these important ministries in momentum, or maintain our buildings or help serve in front of or behind the scenes. Thank you for your patience, your perseverance in prayer, and your diligence in serving over the last twelve months. And as many of you will have noticed, we are reaching capacity at our Church Centre, and so we have established a small working group to explore the options for its development and enhancement, so we can continue to help ensure we serve our community.

Amidst all of this joy and wonder, we too are invited to take a journey of faith this Christmas; to put our faith and hope afresh in the God who can and will one day restore all things to how they should be. To continue to follow his star as we roll up our sleeves and work to see God's kingdom come and his will be done in our churches and our community.

And I invite you to join me in this prayer of seasonal renewal:

Gracious God, thank you for the gift of Christmas, your Son Jesus Christ. Amid the world's anxiety I chose to place my trust in Him, the Prince of Peace. Be with me, my loved ones and all those in need this Christmas time. Amen.

I wish you and your loved ones a very Merry Christmas and Happy New Year.

The Food Bank are so grateful for the food and money donations we send. As you can imagine the need this year is greater than ever

So as we approach Christmas and we all consider giving presents to our loved ones please also remember the people this wonderful organisation supports.

The last time we asked they were giving 126 bags to families, single parents and others such as the homeless who might be 'sofa surfing'. Recently one single mother appeared, had been deserted by her partner and was absolutely desperate - homeless and hungry with a babe in arms. Think what Jesus would do.

This year the Food Bank hope to produce Christmas Hampers for everyone they support. They want to include a £10 Meat Voucher (valid until Feb.) Please consider if you can send some money to support this.

Many of us are feeling the pinch ourselves at present but even a gift of £5 will go a long way to help. She told us that it helped to her to remember that, once, when she was just about to jump out of an aircraft. Very scary! But she thought of Jesus being there with her. He'd catch her in His arms! And sure enough -she was OK.

The children have painted a big mural of a stormy sea with little ships on it, so if you go into the Church Centre you'll see it on the large noticeboard in the hall.

What is a Christingle Service?

It is a joyful family service that is named after the Christingles that are lit during the celebration.

Christingles are made from an orange (but in cider country here in Winscombe, we use an apple!) decorated with red tape, sweets and a candle.



Christingles began in the Moravian Church in Germany. At a children's service in Marienborn in 1747, Bishop Johannes de Watteville looked for a simple way to explain the happiness that had come to people through Jesus. He decided to give the children a symbol to do this. And in 1968, John Pensom of The Children's Society adapted the Christingle and introduced it to the Church of England.

And as we celebrate Christingle we also have a collection to support The Children' Society and their work with children and young people in the darkest situations imaginable.

Our Christingle Service also looks forward to Christmas and is the first of the many family services that will happen in the Parish during the Christmas season. Please do come and join us at 3.00pm on Sunday 11th December in St James's Church on Winscombe Hill – you can be assured of a warm, candlelit welcome!

Friendship Lunch at Sandford Station Friday 16th December



St Monica Trust and Churchill & Langford Minibus Society are teaming up to offer a 'Friendship Lunch' at Sandford Station Retirement Community to isolated people in our surrounding villages on *Friday* **16**th **December 2022**. We hope that this will become a monthly event.

Can you help to identify isolated people in our villages who would appreciate an invitation?

We are really looking for people who are not connected to their local community through church and/or those who cannot attend local community events due to transport/financial issues.

Do you know of any neighbours who are in this situation?

Our aim is to target those people who very rarely have an opportunity to leave their homes.

We will offer guests transport to and from their homes to Sandford Station (using the Churchill minibus) and lunch in our Pullman Restaurant for an *optional* donation.

The residents of Sandford Station have been raising money to support this initiative.

Donations will go towards supporting future 'Friendship Lunch' events.

We have also invited a pianist to come and play for our guests after lunch in the lounge.

The minibus usually serves people living in Burrington, Churchill, Langford, Winscombe, Sandford, Shipham and Banwell (but Trevor is willing to collect from a little further afield, eg Wrington, Axbridge for this occasion).

Unfortunately we cannot take wheelchairs but walking frames are fine. Guests will need to be able to negotiate with assistance a few steps with a handrail to board the minibus.

The Holly



Now the holly bears a berry

The holly is the UK's most common native evergreen found in hedgerows, ancient deer parks, native woodlands and historic gardens. There are in fact more than 400 species found around the world.

Here are a few interesting facts about the holly whose Latin name, Ilex Aquifolium, means 'with pointed leaves' although not all of them are prickly!

Superstition, magic and myth surround the holly.

The Druid's, Celts and Romans brought evergreens into their homes in winter believing that their ability to keep their leaves was magical and assured the return of Spring. However, they believed it was bad luck to cut down a holly entirely.

In Christianity, holly leaves represent Christ's crowns of thorns, the berries his blood and the evergreen symbolises life after death.

The original Yule Log burnt at Christmas was holly not a chocolate cake!

Place names which include 'Holm' or 'Hollin' refer to sites where holly grew.

In heraldry, holly is used to symbolise truth.

The prickles on holly are a very successful deterrent to browsing animals. But look high up in a holly tree canopy and you might notice the leaves are less spiny. Unless giraffes are wandering around our countryside, fewer spines are needed high up. Most spines are produced lower down were sheep, goats, cattle, horses and deer are likely to browse the leaves.

Holly berries, leaves and bark are all mildly toxic because they contain theobromine a substance which is similar to caffeine. The Yaupon Holly found in the U.S.A. has the botanical name Ilex Vomitoria and was used by Native Indians as a traditional medicine to induce vomiting.

Each individual holly plant is either male or female. Bushes of each type are needed for cross-pollination to guarantee berries, so bushes laden with berries at Christmas are always female, while those without might be male or a female that's growing in isolation. Confusingly, the garden variety Golden King is female, while Golden Queen is male!

In winter thrushes such as Blackbirds, Redwing and Fieldfare gorge themselves on holly berries and spread the seed. Many birds will nest in holly as its spiky leaves protect them from predators, or roost in it in winter.

In the Harry Potter novels holly is used as the wood for Harry's wand.

A plant that has everything including a bad reputation!

After a beautiful summer with a wonderful harvest of flowers, fruit, vegetables and seeds not just for us but for wildlife too, we are now entering a more demanding time for the wildlife we have encouraged.

Have you ever wondered how this myriad of insects and birds particularly survive especially if a tidy garden is desired so that much cutting back has been done?

Where are the birds, insects or their eggs, larvae and pupae to go to find shelter, food and breeding places for the coming spring?

Ivy is one answer!

Ivy begins to come into flower in late October, then November and even into December. It is time to think about any ivy that is growing in your garden and so I have written some of its good points below to help you make a decision as to its value in the garden.

Remember that ivy only flowers on older growth not on the young. Many blame ivy for helping to pull down trees. Others are reluctant to allow it to grow on sheds and walls because the roots can be very clingy. However these unwelcome growths can always be dealt with but here are some great reasons for growing some ivy:

- It is evergreen so providing shelter for a variety of creatures during winter.
- It grows in the shade where few other plants grow.
- It provides shelter for insects especially adult butterflies like the Brimstone when many other trees and shrubs are starkly bare.
- ❖ It flowers very late in the year. Therefore it provides pollen and nectar for pollinating insects especially honey bees and late flying butterflies. Honey bees store some pollen in their hive as protein for their young in the spring.
- Its berries provide winter food for blackbirds, thrushes and even fieldfares and redwings.
- ❖ The berries, that are black, ripen when most other fruits have been eaten.
- It's flower buds provide food for the Holly Blue butterfly.



Following Covid, we have had some very interesting speakers on Wednesday evenings at Mendip Springs Golf Club.

Rebecca Sheehy is the CEO of "Bristol After Stroke" a charity which, helps victims of strokes to adapt to life with new disabilities. The most common symptoms are loss of mobility on one side, aphasia and some sight problems. She reminded us of the FAST acronym; Face (drooping), Arms (hard to raise), Speech (slurred) and Time to call 999! Get treated fast!

The charity does a fantastic job providing counselling, physiotherapy, social gatherings, and home assessments. They try to reduce the risk of further incidents. Last year the 850 people were registered with them.

David Excel is the Charity's Treasurer, who, despite his advancing years raised £50,000 for them by his mind blowing athletic efforts. He took part in the Marathon des Sables in the Moroccan Sahara. He described his efforts in which he walked 250 kilometres in 7 days, carrying bedding, food, a stove and clothing in his rucksack in extreme temperatures.

Professor Peter Langley, gave a very interesting illustrated talk about the African Tsetse fly in Zimbabwe and The Ivory Coast. We heard how the Tsetse fly is a blood feeder on domestic animals and humans, in hot and humid areas, but not on wild animals which have immunity. Their "bite" (injecting an anti-coagulant) gives rise to sleeping sickness, in humans, which can be fatal if not treated early enough. Curative drugs are available and a vaccine might be in the pipeline. Lack of awareness, coupled with finances, continues to be a problem.

John Bewick was a Flight Test Engineer for Rolls Royce. His experiences embraced a wide range of flying in fast jets, helicopters, fuel tankers, flying test beds and flights on a wide range of aircraft, among them Concorde.

His role was a pivotal part of the engine testing process in establishing safe operating parameters for the aircraft. His military work began with work on the RB199 engines on the Vulcan aircraft followed by work on fast jets including the Hawk and Jaguar. Flying on these involved specific medical assessment and survival training including ejection from the aircraft and water survival training. He illustrated the causes of surge, engine failure and re-ignition as key phases of the testing process. We then saw a very hair raising film of a plane tumbling from 20,000 ft after engine blowout until the pilot established re-ignition at about 10,000 ft. Fascinating stuff.



Gardening Notes for December

House Plants

Christmas and the New Year are favourite periods for houseplants to be given as presents.

Here are a few tips on how to get the best out of them and care for them after they have bloomed. Some plants prefer warm dry conditions and others prefer to be in a humid environment.

The most popular plants at this time of year are Cyclamen, Miniature Roses, Christmas Cacti, Poinsettia and Indoor Azalea.



Cyclamen prefer a cool position in bright but not sunny light. Water from below once the compost dries out and never leave the pot standing in water. Add houseplant fertiliser fortnightly and remove dead flower stalks and leaves. After flowering leave to dry out until new growth begins again in the autumn.

Miniature Roses are also a very popular present. The prefer a cool bright windowsill but unlike cyclamen the pot should be stood on wet gravel to maintain a high humidity. Snip off faded flowers and reduce the stems by half to a bud when they have finished flowering. These plants have been forced to induce flowering outside their natural period and should be repotted into a larger pot and fed weekly.

Christmas Cacti enjoy a semi shaded warm spot out of direct sunlight. Stand on a tray of wet gravel to replicate the humid jungle-like conditions from which they originate. Faded flowers will fall off and when flowering has finished rest the plant in a cool room and reduce watering for a couple of months Move to a warmer position in spring and increase watering, a second drier period in autumn will encourage new flowers to form.

Poinsettia require a minimum temperature of 14°C, avoiding draughts and direct sources of heat in a bright but not sunny position. Do not saturate the compost but water sparingly when the compost feels dry; mist frequently. Add tomato feed once a month. Cut back hard in April and repot, allowing only 12 hours of light daily from early October to produce good winter colour.

Indoor Azalea need their compost to be moist. Stand in a saucer of moist gravel using rainwater rather than tap water. After flowering repot into a larger plastic pot using ericaceous compost, reduce watering and feed fortnightly until next winter. Plants prefer bright light in a cool room. Keep outside in summer.

OCTOBER RESCUES

In October there were eleven shouts between three of our four lifeboat stations (Minehead 5, Portishead 4 & Weston-super-Mare 2). It was not an actual rescue, but on the night of 11th October a multi-agency training exercise was held in the middle of our part of the Bristol Channel. The exercise was planned and managed by HM Maritime and Coastguard, South & West Wales, and involved both lifeboats from Burnham-on-Sea, both lifeboats from Weston-super-Mare (D-Class & Atlantic 85), the Portishead Atlantic 85, the Penarth D-Class and the Barry Dock Trent Class All Weather Lifeboat. These large-scale training operations are critical for building each team's experience in cross-working, rescue Co-ordination and multi-asset searching.

New Bishop's Incredible Journey!

In a special service at Wells Cathedral on Saturday 12th November the Right Reverend Michael Beasley became the 80th Bishop of Bath and Wells, but before the service he had a busy morning, out and about meeting people as he travelled from Bath back to Wells, using different modes of transport along the way.

A phrase that has stuck with Bishop Michael from the service when he became a bishop is 'bishops know their people and their people know them' so, rather than make a conventional car journey from attending Morning Prayer at Bath Abbey, back to Wells, Bishop Michael took a different approach, using different forms of transport and meeting the people of the diocese along the way.



After an early departure from the Bishop's Palace Bishop Michael headed up to Bath Abbey to meet worshippers there.

From Bath he travelled to Odd Down Park & Ride, stopping for a chat with First Bus driver Les and Operations Manager, Thomas who was motivated



to join the bus company after his experience of being reliant on bus travel as a child.



At Peasedown St John Bishop Michael donned his bicycle helmet and cycled through the town to The Hive community centre. He then met staff and volunteers at The Hive community centre before being taken away by local PCSO and member of the Christian Police Association, Rob.

Next it was a drive through Chilcompton to the Mulberry Factory with local farmer, George.







In Chilcompton Bishop Michael received a tour of the Mulberry Factory, meeting staff and discovering the workmanship that goes into each bag making them in demand around the world, as well as their long-standing commitment to repairing and upcycling old bags which dates back over 30 years.

Finally Bishop Michael arrived back in Wells thanks to local haulage firm, Massey Wilcox and their vintage lorry.



In Wells Bishop Michael caught up with Town Crier, Len Swales, who had been sharing the news of the Bishop's Installation in the city's market place and then moved on to the Bishop's Palace.

At the Palace Bishop Michael found time to plant a tree with his son, Charlie who had grown the sapling from an acorn, before getting ready for the afternoon's service.

Bishop Michael said in his sermon that his gift of the sapling was an example of just one of the things we can do to bring about the harvest of God's life into God's world and asked all those present "will you plant a sapling as a sign that under God each of us, in every place, can play our part in working for change, for transformation, for life. Small actions that when we undertake them together make a big difference."



As well as the offer of receiving a hazel sapling, attendees received information on where best to plant the sapling as well as updates on the environmental work of churches in Bath and Wells, including their Wilder Churches project with the Somerset Wildlife Trust.

Representatives from every parish across Bath and Wells attended the service, young and old. Members of clergy together with parish lay representatives and guests from local schools, businesses, and civic society. All were encouraged by Bishop Michael to ".....be people who long for a harvest - a world transformed into a place of peace, fairness, service, justice, loving-kindness."

His Light is Never Extinguished



As 2022 comes to a close, our hearts go out to the people of Ukraine whose country was invaded by Russia on the 24th February this year. In the months since, we have watched in horror as civilians, cities and infrastructure have been attacked, land occupied and atrocities committed.

The UK has received more than 100,000 people fleeing from the conflict. The gift of their presence among us reminds us that this is no "quarrel in a faraway country, between people of whom we know nothing".

As we recall once again the coming into the world of Jesus at Christmas, our challenge is to connect our celebration of his birth with the realities and consequences of the conflict that is happening.

Sadly, it's not hard to see the links. Jesus was born in a land (Palestine) that had been annexed by an expansionist foreign power (Rome) in pursuit of its territorial ambitions. The demands of the Roman occupiers meant that Jesus' birth happened not at home in Nazareth, but at a counting centre - Bethlehem. He was born in a stable because 'there was no room at the inn'. While still a baby, Jesus became a refugee when taken to Egypt due to warnings of atrocities to come.

Viewed this way, the Christmas story is no sentimental fable. It is a brutal foreshadowing of the events that Ukraine and our whole world have encountered this year.

At the same time, it is also a story of hope. For it tells us that even in the very worst that can happen the Christ child whose birth we celebrate knows all too well the realities of the human condition. As a result, in any darkness his light is never extinguished. For he is Emmanuel - God with us.

So as we come to the end of 2022 we give thanks that God is always with us in whatever we face. May he be with Ukraine. May he be with Russia. And may he be welcomed by us all.
