June Is Bustin' Out All Over!



I love most kinds of music and often relax by listening to, or watching, musicals. Recently I re-watched Carousel and one of the songs in it is entitled 'June is Bustin' Out All Over'. Hopefully, this June, our surroundings will be 'bustin out' with flowers in blossom and warmth from the sun.

When you read this article, our churches will have just celebrated the feast of Pentecost, the Christian festival that comes fifty days after Easter. Pentecost is regarded as the birthday of the Christian Church, when Jesus' disciples were first filled with the amazing power of the Holy Spirit. From being a group of people uncertain of what the future held for them, the disciples suddenly found meaning and purpose for their lives. That gift from God of the Holy Spirit transformed them and gave them the courage, and the encouragement, to speak out about who Jesus was, how he fulfilled the prophecies that had gone before, and what he meant to them and to the rest of the world. In a way they were 'bustin out all over' with the good news of Jesus.

Unfortunately, in today's world, most people will have no concept of the Holy Spirit at all. Even in many Christian churches, the Holy Spirit is not considered to be relevant to our time. Yet, it was Jesus himself who promised that he would give us all the gift of the Holy Spirit to walk alongside us, to guide us, to give us strength and courage, to comfort us and to help us share God's love with those around us.

For others, like those early disciples, those feelings overflow and they feed both you and those around you. They are 'bustin out all over!' God's plan for us is to be a blessing for others, and the gifts that his Holy Spirit gives us should overflow from us to help others and enable them to see and feel God's love for them.

I am going to finish with the words of another song that perhaps we could use as a personal prayer in these weeks following Pentecost.

'Spirit of the Living God, fall afresh on me. Break me, melt me, mould me, fill me. Spirit of the Living God, fall afresh on me.'

Coronation Celebrations in Our Villages

We were lucky across the three villages of Winscombe, Sandford and Churchill to have a wide variety of events to celebrate the Coronation of King Charles III. Here is a roundup of local 'Coronation News'.



Coronation Coffee Morning

On Tuesday 2nd May over 75 people gathered for a celebratory Coffee Morning at the Church Centre in Winscombe.

The hall looked very festive with special coronation plates and serviettes, bunting and a beautiful display created by Angela Morris.

Guests were greeted and entertained wonderfully by our pianist for the morning, David, who played a fabulous selection of music from the shows.

The refreshments served represented the four corners of the United Kingdom; Victoria sponge cakes decorated with edible coronation emblems; Scottish shortbread; Barra Brith from Wales and shamrock shaped biscuits for Northern Ireland.

We were thrilled that their Majesties found time to drop in for coffee and cake, no doubt enjoying the respite from all the rehearsals for the big day. Queen Camilla was delighted to receive a posy presented by Margaret from Dunster Court.



Churchill's Weekend Celebrations

Following so closely after the events to mark the Platinum Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth, there was initially some reticence on the part of the Village Fund organising committee to 'go large' to mark the coronation of King Charles III. However, after some debate, it was decided that we had the requisite stamina and drive, so plans commenced in earnest at the turn of the year. Unsurprisingly, the events bore a remarkable similarity to those of June 2022.



The weekend got off to a really good start with the lighting of the parish's beacon that was designed and installed by artist blacksmith, Sam Bailey. A good crowd gathered to enjoy a family BBQ (staffed by members of Churchill Cricket Club), music and just after 9pm, the lighting of the beacon. This year we invited Jackie Bush, Chair of the Parish Council, to do the honours of setting fire to the combustible material some 8 feet above her head and this she managed on cue with aplomb, despite some understandable trepidation. Flames and sparks soon danced merrily into the clear Somerset skies, much to the delight of those assembled.

Saturday dawned wet and dreary, but with an improving forecast as the day progressed. Volunteers made light work of setting up the marquee so that, as the King returned to Buckingham Palace, we were ready to welcome families to a fun afternoon to the backdrop of some excellent teas and cakes served by the local church communities. The bouncy castle, hoopla, henna tattoos and candy floss proved to be a hit with young (and



old in the latter case) and the marquee was really buzzing with chatter and laughter for the whole afternoon.



A quick three hour turn round ensued before we were again ready to welcome guests to a night of dancing to the band, Replica, with their amazing singer, Sam (supported by our very own Zena), and our DJ from last year, Mandy. They soon got the sell-out crowd rocking while James and Kirsty from the Market Kitchen provided much needed sustenance in the form of a superb hog roast with very generous portions. Sadly, our licence only ran until midnight, so it fell to the Chair of the Village Fund to make the

unpopular decision to bring a tremendous coronation party to a close.

Sunday morning brought a celebration service hosted by the churches in the parish. It was extremely well attended by young and old alike with a highlight being the children's choir from Churchill Primary School. More tea and cakes were provided as parishioners then got together for the Big Coronation Lunch to the strains of patriotic music in the bright sunshine.

All in all, Churchill and Langford celebrated the coronation of our new king in some style - long may he reign. Thanks go to all those volunteers who made the events happen - we could not have done it without you!

Coronation Celebrations in Winscombe and Sandford

The Winscombe and Sandford Festival and Flags group organised events marking the historic occasion of the Coronation of King Charles and Queen Camilla. The villages celebrated in



style, making memories for all who were able to be there. The funds were available due to the success of the late Queen's Platinum Jubilee Celebrations last year.

A Scarecrow Hunt was held in both villages and the winner voted by the community was 'Stormy Sam'

A relaxed start to Saturday's events enabled everyone to watch the Coronation from the comfort of their homes. Everyone was encouraged to arrive from 2.00 pm and hold their street parties in the marquee with their neighbours and friends and bring their own picnics. Tables were decorated, and families arrived. The scavenger hunt and tabletop quizzes were popular. The tuck



shop did a good trade and the special designed village souvenirs of badges, coasters and fridge magnets sold well. D J Tav, kept the party atmosphere alive with his music. A BBQ and bar ran all afternoon and evening.

The Winscombe Community Singers started serenading the crowds at 3:00pm ending with a Toast to the new King and Queen led by Mike Bravery and the audience invited to join in with the National Anthem.

At 4.00 pm the party got louder when 'Kidstime' children's entertainer had the whole crowd cheering, encouraging adults as well as children to join in the dancing, magic and fun.

Copious amounts of candy floss, popcorn and ice cream were eaten. Tired children and adults were sad when the marquee had to close at 6.00 pm but it was all outside for the next event.

Avon and Somerset Mounted Police officer PC Webber brought Police Horse Oscar to be renamed 'Sandford' and Martin Thatcher DL presented the plaque. Sandford was accompanied by PC Livingstone rid ing Police Horse Tyson. Sidcot School kindly brought Mango and Poppet, their gorgeous Shetland ponies, along to support the naming ceremony and to meet the children from our uniformed organisations who formed a very impressive 'guard of honour' for the occasion.





The marquee re opened at 7.00 pm with two live bands 'Super Blue Moon' and 'Elevation'. The evening was very well attended with over 400 wrist bands sold. People dancing the night away kept the bar busy and a great time was had by all.

Sunday 7th at 11.00 pm saw Churches Together hold its special Coronation Service and the 1st Winscombe Scouts were very smart as they marched in the colours and joined in the service. This was followed by a BYO picnic and a wonderful

Royal themed family quiz was organised by Jo, Derrick, Hillary, Martin and Beth. The atmosphere was relaxed, and the sun shone as 8 teams battled it out, a very enjoyable way to end a hectic weekend.

The scouts took over the marquee at 5.00 pm and held their annual overnight camp. They were certainly busy over the weekend!

I would like to extend a thank you for all the help and support we received from Church members with the Coronation Celebrations. Help was given with publicity, leaflet design and delivery, banner design and display, pop up sales of wrist bands and souvenirs, and photocopying including an 'emergency dash by Andrew on Saturday for more scavenger hunt sheets. All the help was very much appreciated. The Church was certainly in the heart of the Village on the Coronation Weekend.

Messy Church in May

I wonder if you remember how old you were, or when you learned 'The Lord's Prayer'?

We gather that although children in our local schools do hear Bible Stories, they don't seem to hear this prayer much in school.

We are privilege, in this area, that the primary schools welcome teams from our local churches to take an assembly each week. Frequently "Open the Book" materials are used. A story is narrated from 'The Lion Story Teller Bible', senior pupils help to enact the story for the rest of the school, and a short reflection follows.

BUT the Lord's Prayer isn't one of the topics within this framework! So, at Messy Church we're having a couple of sessions on this theme.



Hilary helped the children create a beautiful picture of some praying hands using different colour pieces of felt. We had a gingerbread man with a big red heart on his chest to signify "our Father in heaven" who loves us. And we made orbs.

We all remembered the coronation of King Charles III the previous weekend, featuring an orb. Orbs signify "Godly power": a cross above a globe, representing "Christ's dominion over the world." The monarch is to be God's representative on Earth. So, an orb is an appropriate symbol as we pray "Your kingdom come, your will be done on earth as it is in heaven!"



We also started on another painted mural of the hills and lake of Galilee where the disciples first heard the prayer, and our story-drama featured the disciples being given the words of the prayer by Jesus.

We were delighted to welcome Martin Hagen again who, with Hilary, led the children in two worship songs, which we pray will stay with them as they go home and off to school etc.

Next month, instead of Messy Church at the Church Centre, we'll be in a gazebo at Winscombe Primary School PTFA School Fete. We'll be taking some puzzles and other activities and we hope that it will be a chance to let more local parents know about what we do at both Messy Church and the "Open the Book" school assemblies.

Supporting and Protecting our Natural World

Stinging Nettles! They are not to be despised.



Most of us realise that nettles are edible and are good for you, but we may be reluctant to eat them because they sting! The sting disappears once the nettle is cooked. In fact, nettles provide us with iron, vitamins (B &C) flavonoids, proteins and other essential minerals.

For much the same nutritional reasons nettles make an ideal plant food especially for use in the greenhouse. They have more nitrogen and less potassium than

comfrey, so they are best for feeding leafy greens such as salad leaves and brassicas. Select younger leaves, as they contain more nitrogen and less tough cellulose and lignin, so they break down quickly in water. Fill a container half to three quarters full with leaves. Top up with water, then cover it and wait 3 to 4 weeks, then strain the solution. The resultant mixture may need to be diluted to the colour of weak tea.

However, even more important is that most of our favourite butterflies depend on nettles as the ONLY food for their very fussy caterpillars. These include the Peacock, Small Tortoiseshell, Red Admiral and Painted Lady. Sometimes Comma butterflies lay their eggs on nettles too as do several types of moths.



Thus, nettles are vital for the lives of our most well-known butterflies. The adults are not nearly so fussy and take nectar from a wide variety of flowers! The caterpillars are really not even fond of the small nettle or dead nettles so it would be good to boost the declining numbers of these beautiful insects by providing a patch of nettles in a sunny corner of the garden. Being unaffected by their sting, nettles are a good choice for caterpillars because they offer protection from predators including herbivores such as cattle, sheep and deer all of which are keen to avoid the sting. Birds too love to find caterpillars, especially when they are feeding youngsters. Chicks can eat 100 caterpillars a day, so 5 chicks would need 500 caterpillars! Exhausting work and no wonder butterflies need to lay so many eggs.



The eggs and larvae of these butterfly species are present on nettles between April and June, with adults emerging between May and October. Insects employ various ways to survive. Female butterflies lay many, many eggs during their short life to ensure that even a small number of these eggs will survive and hatch into caterpillars. The eggs are usually laid in a protected location on the nettles that the caterpillar will eat. Often, as they grow, the masses of larvae surround themselves in silk webbing to provide protection, so that they don't become a feast for passing birds.



These caterpillars have broken out of their web and are feeding on the nettle leaves.

It's important to treat nettles like any other garden plant if you are growing for the benefit of butterflies. Cut them regularly to get good fresh growth from the nettles. March and October are good months but ensure that there are no eggs or larvae on the leaves. Watch out for any leaves that are curled or folded in any way. Something is going on inside!

Nettle Soup

As mentioned nettles are good for you so here is a simple recipe to try – nettle soup taken from the book 'Wild Food' by Roger Phillips.



Firstly, prepare the nettles using only young leaves before they flower. Wash and drain them.

Chop up one large potato, one carrot, one onion and garlic to taste. Sauté them in a 2-litre saucepan with a tablespoon of olive oil and a bit of butter to taste.

When the onion starts to soften and the potato is forming a slight crust, drop in the nettles and give them a quick whisk around with a spatula.

Then add a litre of boiled water and 2 to 4 cups of vegetable stock. Stir it all up and let it bubble for about 12 minutes, or until the potato is soft.

Liquidise it once it has cooled, then return to the pan to warm it when you are ready to serve.

To serve, pour the soup into a bowl and add some cream.

There are various other ingredients that can be added so it is worth experimenting.

Nettle soup freezes easily which is a plus.

A Famous Birthday In June



Captain Robert Falcon Scott's name is virtually inseparable from the history of Antarctic Exploration although he is perhaps more famous for his death than his achievements and career. His dedication to exploring the Antarctic is both inspiring and heartbreaking.

Scott was born on 6th June 1868 in Devonport, Plymouth, the third of six children. His father, John, was a brewer and a magistrate. Unfortunately he was declared bankrupt after selling the brewery and making some

unwise financial decisions. The family were forced to move to Shepton Mallet. When his father died Robert and his brother Archie were left to provide for his mother.

Scott began his career in the Royal Navy in 1881, at just 13 years old, having excelled in the entrance exams for the naval training ship, HMS Britannia.

Opportunities for career growth were rare and after a chance meeting with Clements Markham, who was President of the Royal geographical Society, Scott volunteered to lead an impending Antarctic Expedition. His achievements in this expedition were the discovery of the Southern Plateau and reaching latitude 82°, fewer than 550 miles from the South Pole. He was joined by Ernest Shackleton who later succumbed to the harsh conditions and led to a falling out with Scott which continued long after the expedition.

Scott was promoted to Captain upon his return from the expedition and became a Commander of the Royal Victorian Order, he later became commander of the battleship, HMS Albemarie.

In 1908 Scott married the socialite Kathleen Bruce at the Chapel Royal Hampton Court Palace. They had one son, Peter, who later founded the World Wide fund for Nature.

Scott returned to the Antarctic with the ill-fated Terra Nova Expedition of 1910-1913. The expedition was faced with many challenges. Scott's team was attempting to be the first to reach the South Pole and clinch that achievement for the British Empire. However, they arrived on 17th January 1912 to find that they had been beaten by just 5 weeks to their goal by Ronald Amundsen, the Norwegian explorer.

Scott and his companions died on their return from the Pole, on 29th March 1912 but their bodies were discovered by a search party some eight months later.

Scott was a meticulous diary keeper and so the only record of his experiences is through diary notes and letters to loved ones. His final diary entry called upon the public to take care of all their families. This inspired giving by the public in support. On behalf of her husband, Kathleen Scott was awarded the Knighthood which Robert Falcon Scott would have received if he had returned from the second expedition.

The life of 'Scott of the Antarctic' has been celebrated through books, screenplays, monuments and films.



SANDFORD & DISTRICT GARDENING CLUB

At our May meeting we welcomed our speaker Myra Cox who gave a most informative and amusing talk on 'Flower Arranging with Flowers from Our Gardens'.

Myra told us how to begin with an outline shape of the arrangement and suitable containers to use: pots, jars, covered boxes, garden containers, the list is endless!

Oasis should be used by taping it to the container having soaked it thoroughly before hand. When oasis is old break it up and use it in the bottom of a plant pot.

Some of the plants she used for her arrangements were viburnum, pittosporum (Tom Thumb variety), lilies, gypsophila, carnations and Canterbury bells.

She made arrangements in jars (decorated with wool wrapped round the jars in different colours) and flowers from the garden. She also covered a box with shiny paper and made an arrangement with red, white and blue flowers for the coronation.

Myra also told us an old saying "Flowers should not be put too close, leaving enough room for a butterfly to go through!"

Myra brought along a little Jack Russell dog called Sally. She told us she was looking after Sally for an elderly person through the Cinnamon Trust. They help elderly people by volunteering to look after their dog and giving them some respite.

Sally was well behaved and walked among us!

The raffle took place with the inclusion of the flower arrangements made by Myra.

John thanked everyone who had helped to make the Spring Show in March a success. There is still one ticket for the outing in June please see John if you are interested.

Gardening Notes for June

Growing Herbs in Containers.



There is a wide range of herbs that can be grown in containers separately or together if they like similar conditions. This is a great use of space and can be ornamental. Placed by your back door you can benefit from their scent and easy harvesting.

The three basic culinary herbs sage, rosemary and thyme grow happily together. Tender annuals such as sweet basil and purple perilla can be

planted out in early summer together with nasturtium.

Chives go well in a container together with biennial parsley, which can be sown often for a regular supply.

The more tender perennial herbs such as rose geranium, lemon verbena and French tarragon grow well together during the summer in a sunny position but will need protection from frost.

Larger herbs such as horseradish and fennel will not do well in pots for long and need more space as they will swamp smaller plants.

Mints like a moist soil but are invasive, so many are best grown in pots. Divide and replant every two years when plants look straggly. A clipped standard bay adds form and height to any group of containers.

Most herbs like a free draining potting compost such as John Innes No2 with extra grit. Water herbs as necessary and feed regularly with balanced liquid feed.

Routine Tasks

Continue to make sowings of beetroot, lettuce and carrots, also sow seed of swedes, turnips, spring cabbage, purple sprouting and French beans.

Keep up with the weeding, cutting off young seedlings with a dutch hoe, preferably in the morning on a dry day.

Watch out for the scarlet lily beetle, pick them off, but place your other hand underneath to prevent them dropping off into the soil.

Regularly feed vegetables, fruit and ornamentals in growing bags, pots and hanging baskets with a high potash liquid feed, as growing medium will soon run out of nutrients.

Keep up with the dead heading especially delphiniums and lupins to encourage a second flush of flowers also cutting back oriental poppies and pulmonaria to ground level for a fresh rosette of foliage.

Daffodil foliage which has been allowed to die back can be cut or strimmed on open grown or removed from borders where it has become unsightly.

Lawns may benefit from an application of liquid fertiliser at this time of year, it is also advisable to raise the cutting height of the mower giving a lighter trim more frequently.



Recent Speakers

Carl Morgan, Music Therapist.

Carl, our speaker for the night recently, was an inspiration! Born with a vision impairment, he had around 40% vision up into his twenties but sadly this deteriorated over the years, and he is now almost totally blind. Through sheer perseverance and an obvious sharp intelligence, he became the first blind person in England to achieve a master's degree. He is also a very accomplished and qualified musician in both guitar, piano, singing.

Carl works as a music therapist, sharing the power of music with a wide range of clients including Special Needs children and within adult care homes. His description of working with non-verbal clients, enabling them to express, and share, how they feel through music, was extremely powerful and made a profound impression on everyone in the room, as did his use of music memories for patients with dementia.

Carl gave us a real insight into the day-to-day experience of a blind person. He talked of the technique of walking with a long cane, how to help guide a blind person (let them take your arm, rather than taking their arm), reading braille, how to use braille watches and how to play with braille playing cards. He described the painfully slow, incremental method of how a blind person learns to play music.

Nepal earthquakes

Regular readers of this column will know of our work and support for the Shiva Charity rebuilding schools and toilets in Nepal following the earthquake in 2015. Our own Paul Jenkins recently returned to Nepal to review progress. He was greatly impressed. The manual block making machine which we donated has been extensively used to make thousands of blocks in order to build reinforced buildings. He showed updated photos of the Dipsheeka School, with "our" WC block and other schools where the Shiva Trust have been involved, with their water filtration plants. He described the country as a young, dynamic society and an admirable recipient of our efforts.

He had also been fortunate enough to join a helicopter trip up to the Langtang Valley, close to the Tibetan border. Langtang village, at 4,000 metres, was destroyed by a massive avalanche as a result of the April 2015 earthquake, with over 300 deaths and only one building surviving. The village is being rebuilt literally on top of the old village and the mountainous backdrop to the village makes it a significant tourist destination, in spite of its altitude.



APRIL SHOUTS

In April there were 11 Shouts between three of our four Lifeboat Stations (Minehead 2, Portishead 5, W-s-M 4). On 29th April, Portishead Lifeboat was paged, and the crew launched at 4:01 pm to a yacht that had lost engine power just at the mouth of the River Avon en route to Bristol. The casualty vessel managed to get an anchor down as they started to drift towards the mud bank. Once on scene the RNLI crew made sure that all 4 people on board and their 2 dogs were safe and well; they were well equipped and were all wearing lifejackets. The crew set up a long tow initially, then swopped to an alongside tow and the casualty vessel was taken to Portishead Marina where their shore crew helped them onto the pontoon.

A Commitment to Serve

'Your Majesty, as children of the kingdom of God we welcome you in the name of the King of kings'.

In reply to these opening words at his Coronation, King Charles III responded 'In his name and after his example I come not to be served but to serve.' This short exchange summed up what the service was about and what it intended to convey.

The King's commitment to service is not in any doubt. To give just a few examples, he has engaged with our most challenged communities far more than any politician, he called on us to care for the environment years before it became popular to do so and, of course, founded The Prince's Trust, which supports our most challenged younger people in so many ways.


He becomes king of a new era, the Carolean era. Our times see us face some big challenges. Our question is how to address them. I was immensely struck by all the agencies and charities present in the Abbey for the King's Coronation. Their participation spoke of the ways in which we're going to need to act differently in the years ahead to address the issues that confront us.

Because it's all too evident that the power of government, be that local or national, to respond to the problems we see, is less now than it was when the late Queen began her reign. Our challenge in this era is of how we're going to come together, in service, to address the different challenges that lie before us, be that the climate, how we tackle poverty, how we respond to a troubled international situation. All of us will have a part to play.

Where to find the resource to act in the way that's going to be needed? As I stood beside the King at the Coronation what inspired me was to see the way he drew so much strength, purpose and resolve and assurance from his Christian faith for the service he's called to give. And in that we can follow him too.
