God Save the King!



On May 6th we will witness the coronation of our king and his consort. For anyone under the age of about 75 years this will be their first experience of the momentous religious ceremony which dates back to Anglo Saxon times.

Originally the monarch was the ruler of the country and the coronation was the confirmation of his or her political authority. But in the 16th century the monarch assumed religious responsibilities as well when Henry VIII broke

away from the Church of Rome. Under the Act of Supremacy Henry declared himself Governor of the new Protestant Church of England with power to appoint Bishops. Initially, no other forms of religion were permitted but over time laws were gradually relaxed, at least for non-conformists.

Following the Act of Union with Scotland in 1707 the monarchy acquired a certain responsibility for the protection of the Church of Scotland, (Presbyterian) and the appointment of a *Lord High Commissioner*. This is a largely ceremonial role and Queen Elizabeth II frequently appointed someone to represent her at the opening of the Church Assembly of Scotland.

Today the monarch is still responsible for the appointment of the archbishops, bishops and certain other senior positions in the Church of England. These appointments are made on the advice of the church and through the Prime Minister. As king, Charles will be expected to attend church services with his family.

When Charles is formally crowned as king on 6th May he will be taking on many responsibilities for the religion of our country in addition to everything else. He and Camilla will need our prayers and the prayers of all Christians. He is living in a very different country from the one which his mother inherited in 1953! As we are constantly reminded, we now live in multi-cultural society. Even more significantly only a minority of the population now claim to be Christian, whereas in the 1950s more than 80% of the population would describe themselves as Christian on official forms. Weddings in Church were the norm and most couples sought to have their children baptised even if they rarely came to church. Church attendance today is less than a third of what it was in the 1950s and falling.

Charles must be the king of people of many faiths or none and yet still manage to uphold the Christian faith. Let us pray for King Charles and Camilla and all the royal family.

Easter Weekend in Churchill & Langford



Easter Pop Up Café @Churchill Methodist

What a buzz! Children and adults excitedly chatted as they busied themselves with a variety of Easter themed activities.

Those with green fingers designed their own Easter gardens and assembled garden flowers and foliage into delightful spring posies. Meanwhile, crafters made Easter cards and painted sun catchers. Other arty people decorated their own Easter hats. 'Well done!' to Evie, Kasper and Reuben who all won prizes from Rev Meg for their hats.

As always, children enthusiastically searched for chocolate eggs hidden in the church pews, then kindly shared their loot with surprised grownups in the café.

Plenty of hot cross buns and doughnuts were washed down with hot and cold drinks while visitors sat and chatted. It was lovely to meet new residents and familiar friends. Thank you to all who helped and supported this community event.

At 7am on Easter Sunday morning, under a blue sky and accompanied by birdsong, people gathered by Churchill traffic lights. Their purpose was to commemorate and celebrate the very first Easter Day.

By the Jubilee sculpture, a symbolic bare timber cross had already been erected on Good Friday by other locals, who had walked with it from St John's via Churchill Academy, the Post Office and Churchill Methodist, with several pauses to reflect on the events of the very first Good Friday.

On the first Good Friday, Roman soldiers were posted to guard Jesus' tomb which was sealed with a rock. Yet, the earliest visitors on the first Easter Sunday were totally shocked and distressed to find the grave empty. Bereft, Mary Magdala and a few women who came to dress the body with spices. They were puzzled and spent time anxiously searching to find out what had become of Jesus' body.

By contrast, why were the 2023 'early birds' at the crossroads so joyful? From witness accounts, Mary Magdala met the risen Jesus near the tomb and Jesus' friends (called disciples) met the risen Jesus in the evening. Thus, Christians believe that Jesus was not just any average human, but also the Son of God. Through his teaching and manner of dying, Jesus showed the power of love, the power of compassion and the power of forgiveness.


Reflecting on events, the disciples understood that Jesus' mission was to show how much God loves each of us and to show humans how to love each other. The challenge to Jesus' friends in the 1st century and to all of us in 2023, is how to respond....

We know we can't expect to control every aspect of our afternoon, so when a small person contributes some black paint onto the blue sky of the Easter mural we were making, we marvelled at Alison Butcher's creative inspiration as the dark sky that we had planned around the Good Friday scene acquired two very ominous and artistic black storm clouds. Those two clouds seem to capture the awfulness of Good Friday in a way that we had not planned, and contrast perfectly with the bright sun, triumphant light and shining grave clothes in the empty tomb.





The children also enjoyed making Easter Gardens complete with tiny crosses, a path, a stone tomb and a stone at the entrance, embellished with beautiful greenery from Hilary and Chris's gardens. The example (left), by one child, gives us cause to pause and reflect.

The Easter Story from Palm Sunday to Easter Day was retold using 50 beautiful cartoon images.

We welcomed members of St James's music group this time. They led us heroically above the clatter of percussion to 'We have a King who rides a donkey... Jesus the King is Risen.' And again, accompanied with waving ribbon wands and some dancing to 'Lord of the Dance'. According to the Bible, Jesus didn't actually say "I am the Lord of the dance." But He did say to his listeners "Follow me!"

We reflected that life can sometimes be like following Jesus in a dance (especially when contemplating His joy and triumph of Easter). At other times it can seem more like a walk or pilgrimage!







Local History Corner

Salt and saltines

Sea salt was a locally sourced item that has featured in the history of the Vale of Winscombe. It was an essential commodity for a number of reasons: it could be used to preserve food; to enhance flavour; as an antiseptic and a fertiliser and even as a form of currency (this is where we get the word *salary* from: payment to Roman legionary soldiers was often made partly in salt).



During the Bronze Age, salt was being produced at Brean Down, and salt production there has been radio carbon dated to between 3500 and 2600 years ago. The inhabitants of this salt making settlement were wealthy enough to have possessed gold ornaments such as those unearthed in 1983 and now in the British Museum.

Salt making continued in places where it was feasible, into the Roman era and beyond, and particularly on the Somerset Levels. It died out as a result of the discovery and mining of rock salt in other parts of the country. One can see the locations of mainly Roman and mediaeval salt production as large low mounds visible on the Levels from the A38 road and M5 motorway.

Salt making also took place near the present junction 21 of the M5 motorway. An excavation in 1988 of one of these salterns near Hunstspill by Richard Brunning, archaeologist with Somerset Environment Department, recovered thousands of pieces of salt making pottery (*briquetage*) and pot fragments dating back to the Roman period as well as a well-preserved wicker basket for carrying salt.

The northern extremity of the Mendips forms a land bridge from the higher inland regions of Somerset to the areas of salt production, and the ancient trackways, such as the line of Barton Road, along the Vale of Winscombe were undoubtedly used in its transport. South of Banwell hill-fort on the north side of the valley, some ancient features have been recorded dating from at least the Bronze Age*. Here, in the boundary ditch between Banwell and Winscombe, a fragment of *briquetage* has been identified. This may possibly suggest that at some period salt water may have reached along the valley as far as Broadleaze Farm. However, this site is also on the ancient trackway which led south across the valley, partly along the line of Church Road and Church Lane, and over Winscombe Hill to the tidal saltwater marshes along the course of the River Axe, so it is most likely that the *briquetage* travelled in a bag of salt to the settlement (perhaps a piece of sharp trading?).



A Famous Birthday in May.



Florence Nightingale was born on 12th May 1820. Famous for being the 'Lady with the Lamp' who organised the nursing of sick and wounded soldiers during the Crimean War, Florence Nightingale's far-sighted ideas and reforms influenced the nature of modern healthcare. Here are a few more unusual facts about the famous nurse:

Florence's parents named their children after the cities of their birth.

Florence was born in Italy and named after the city of her birth. Florence's older sister, Parthenope, was named after her birthplace in Naples.

Florence's father's surname was originally Shore.

He inherited his fortune from his mother's uncle Peter Nightingale, and with it changed his name.

Florence had a natural skill for analysing data.

Florence's early letters demonstrate that she had a natural skill for classifying, analysing and documenting data. She was able to look at data, draw conclusions and create a picture in her mind of the results. She created the first Pie charts to illustrate her findings. In 1860 she was elected the first woman Fellow of the Statistical Society.

Florence wrote a novel.

Florence wrote about the lives of women of her class, which evolved into her novel Cassandra. The novel explored the oppression of the educated and privileged women of Britain. Years later the work was rediscovered and it has become an important feminist text.

Florence rescued and hand-reared an owl.

While in Athens in 1850, Florence saw some boys playing with a ball of fluff, which turned out to be a baby owl. She rescued the owlet, which she named Athena, and hand-reared her, carrying her around in her pocket. After Florence left for the Crimea, the poor creature was neglected and died. It was later stuffed!

Florence turned down several marriage proposals.

She had several marriage proposals but refused them all. One of her suitors later married her sister. The man she came closest to accepting was the philanthropist and poet Richard Monckton Milnes, whom she met in 1842. She knew it was a match her mother would approve of and she thought he would be sympathetic to her interests. However, she eventually turned him down.

Florence was not impressed by the gift Queen Victoria offered the troops in the Crimea.

During the war the public at home began sending items to the Crimea to help the soldiers. People sent all sorts of things, sometimes useful and valuable, but some — although well intended — were useless. Florence listed and distributed all the free gifts that were sent and sometimes despaired of others that she had to store. When Queen Victoria offered to send the troops eau de cologne Florence responded that 'a little gin would more popular'.

As Florence's fame grew, her sister Parthenope acted as her manager.

The first image of Florence as 'The Lady with the Lamp' was published in 1855 and her story gripped the world. Parthenope became her manager, collecting cuttings of her sister, and circulating information and reports. She knew that Florence would demand her privacy to be respected and refused to consent to the release of photographs and pictures. Only two portraits, were published with the family's authorisation, but they were expensive and not intended for the mass market. This meant demand for portraits of Florence became insatiable and had to be created from the imagination. Many depictions of her were romantic and idealised, and looked nothing like her.

New WESTlink Bus Service for North Somerset



A new on-demand bus service has been available to local residents since early last month.

The service consists of up to 30 accessible 16-seater minibuses running across all three zones. The maximum wait time is expected to be 60 minutes.

The minibuses operate across three different zones in the West of England

- North covering areas of South Gloucestershire and Bath and North East Somerset
- South covering areas in North Somerset
- Future Transport Zone- covering North Bristol

You can book 'on demand' or the day before you want to travel.

The buses operate Monday to Saturday from 7.00 am to 7.00 pm (except on Public Holidays)

Journeys can be booked

They operate without a fixed route. Smart technology will match your journey with other customers to best use the space on board.

Simple pleasures from our environment.

'Prayer for the Day' is led by a priest daily at 5.45 am on Radio 4.

Recently the speaker listed 10 things that bring joy to his heart I was surprised to hear that his number one joy was opening a bag of crisps! I see his point.

Then I began to think of my own list just from the natural world. This, I found was very hard there being just too many! So I have settled on five in the hopes that readers may like to add their own.


On reflection I find that they all give me hope for the future as well as joy - a kind of looking forward and that all is well with the world (unlikely but we can dream for a while).



My very favourite is holding a freshly laid egg in the palm of my hand and even better if it is still warm. Within that protective shell is all that is needed to produce a chick (provided that the egg is fertile and that a mother hen can sit on it for exactly 21 days). The chick itself has a reinforced beak to enable it to peck its way out of the shell without any help. Amazing!

Second is the anticipation of seeing the first swallows arrive back to their summer home after a hazardous 6000 mile journey from the southern part of Africa This should be happening sometime in April depending on the weather.

Third is more anticipation; that of waiting for the rather dry and dead looking seeds, that have been sown in pots of



Fourth the delicate fragrance of primroses as they begin to flower profusely sometimes in the harshest of weather and often in the most surprising and new places.

Lastly the lovely welcome from your dog when you return home There is excitement as he or she jumps around with excitement and sometimes with little sounds of joy or even barks. The welcome is always unconditional no questions asked. 'You're late' 'Where have you been?' But there may be the inevitable question 'Should we go for a walk now? I'm ready.'

May Recipe - Elderflower Cordial

(Sophie Grigson)

This is a deliciously refreshing and fragrant drink that can be made in May when the elderflowers are out.

The recipe makes about 1.5 litres or 2.5 pints.

What you will need:

- 1. About 25 large heads of elderflowers.
- 2. 1.8 kilograms (4lb) of granulated sugar
- 3. 1.2 litres water (2 pints)
- 4. 75 grammes citric acid (two and a half ounces). Many chemists will sell the acid
- 5. 2 lemons (preferably organic)

Method.

- Put the elderflowers into a large bowl
- Place the sugar and water into a pan and bring it slowly to near boiling point, stirring all the time until all the sugar has dissolved.
- Pour the hot syrup over the flowers and then stir in the citric acid.
- Grate in the zest of the lemons. Then slice the lemons and lay them over the syrup
- Cover and leave for 24 hours
- Strain the mixture through muslin and pour into very clean bottles (dark green ones are good)
- Label and store in a cool, dark place.

The cordial will keep for several months. It does need to be diluted to taste.

Undiluted it is good on ice cream or in fruit salads. It may also be frozen in plastic bottles.

Recent Speakers

Dr. Nick Hooper,

Nick, already known to many club members, since he had been a GP in Langford, gave us an entertaining, often humorous account of his working life. Initially Nick was with Royal Naval Reserve.

Twenty years later, now a poorly paid doctor with a very young family in New Zealand and Australia, he decided to work his passage home as a medical officer on a large liner being responsible for 1800 passengers, mostly very old or very young.

He joined HMS Flying Fox in Bristol, which was used as an RNR training vessel. Here Nick was the principal medical officer, training doctors and nurses for war work.

Then followed his much respected work as a GP, retiring from civilian medical practice in 2009.

Amongst other roles Nick took on the role of medical escort, flying sick people home from around the world. More recently he has been guiding at Wells Cathedral. Altogether a wonderful career dedicated to service.

Fraud

Jordan and Megan from Avon & Somerset Police, Cyber and Fraudulent Crime Service, spoke about fraud under the banner "Serve, Protect and Respect".

Their vital message is summarised below:

Nearly all fraud is run by criminals overseas and hence catching them and punishing them is not possible, so the service is there to help UK citizens avoid being victims.

41% of all reported crime is fraud, yet not all fraud is reported as too often people are too embarrassed to report it.

That which occurs locally has a gross cost of £121 million, but in reality non-reporting masks the true losses estimated to be around £600 million! Nationally £190 billion is lost in fraud per annum (compare the spending of £160 million on the NHS).

When anyone gets a dubious written or verbal request which is suspicious, don't be taken in by it and even if tempted the key phrase is 'Take5; Tell2'. There is a big difference between availability and vulnerability.

Take 5 – take 5 minutes when scammers or fraudsters call; think before taking any actions. **Tell 2** – tell someone else in the family, a friend, the police, report it and share the information.

In summary: Pause for thought.

We were shown slides of the glass houses where the roses are bred. The pods are harvested and kept in a fridge. Out of 350,000 seeds only about 250,000 seedlings may germinate, these seedlings are then planted in raised beds. All the budding is done by hand. In their third year they are planted out in the ground.

After all the work that is put in to growing a beautiful rose you can understand why they are quite expensive.

There were some beautiful illustrations of the roses that David Austin Roses produce.

Gardening Notes for May

Pruning

To maintain the shape and promote new growth lower down, now is the time to prune spring flowering shrubs after they have finished flowering. Spirea: once it has finished flowering cut the tallest, oldest shoots to the base.



Forsythia is a vigorous shrub and can soon become unmanageable. Simply prune after the last flowers have faded, cutting out the oldest flowered stems each year to encourage strong new shoots from the base.

Other spring flowering shrubs that can be treated this way are deutzia, flowering currant, philadelphus and weigela.

Lilac trees and bushes should only be lightly pruned, cutting out no more than a third. Start by cutting back all spent flowers and any crossing branches, finally cut out suckers from the base and apply a dressing of general fertiliser as with other shrubs that have been pruned. Clematis montana which flower in early spring should be pruned when the flowers have faded as next years flowers will be formed on growth produced this year. These can be reduced up to half or alternatively remove one in three stems down to 6-9ins.

Topiary plants like bay and box should be pruned back into shape now and may also benefit from a further trimming later in the season.

Plant supports

The secret of supporting plants is to make sure you do it before they need rescuing when they never really recover. By doing it early the supports will soon be hidden by the new growth and secondly any plant that has been knocked or blown over will never look the same however carefully you prop it up. Various metal supports are available as well as using hazel twigs or canes for tall flower stems such as delphiniums. It is most important to support flowers like peonies, although the flower stems are not all that tall their blooms are very heavy and the stems tend to drop to the ground particularly when it rains.

Agapanthus

Repot agapanthus once the roots have filled the original container into a slightly larger pot. Remove the plant from its pot (you may need to cut it out) and tease out the roots from the base. Pour some loam based potting compost into the bottom of the new container, placing the plant in the centre and topping up with compost to just below the rim. This boosts growth and ensures continued flowering. Feeding and watering through the rest of the season will help to develop the flower buds.

RESULTS UPDATE

The Branch Treasurer reported at the March Branch AGM that the Branch raised a total of £16,411 in 2022, an increase of £3,993 from the 2021 total of £12,418. Donations, Contribution Boxes and Collections all increased the fundraising total.

RNLI UK & IRELAND NATIONAL OPERATIONS - LIVES SAVED AT SEA IN 2022

The RNLI has just released its operational figures for 2022, revealing that the charity's lifeboat crews and lifeguards saved a total of 506 lives last year. That's more than one life saved every single day of the year. The data, captured between January and December 2022 and shared by the Data and Analytics Team, highlights just how busy their lifesavers have been, with 9,312 lifeboat launches over the course of the last year. That's an increase of 5% on 2021. RNLI lifeboat crews saved the lives of 389 people over the course of 2022, whilst lifeguards saved 117 lives.

MARCH CALL OUTS

After arriving on scene it was clear that there was nobody on

board and that it had been drifting potentially for a while. The crew managed to right the small dinghy and tie it alongside My Lady Anne, the Atlantic 85 class lifeboat; they then towed the small vessel back to the safety of the lifeboat station.

Somerset Day 2023



Somerset Day, celebrated on 11th May every year, gives everyone an opportunity to celebrate Somerset as a place to live, work, play, learn.

Did you know that Somerset is one of the most sought after destinations in the U.K.? Somerset has great cider, tasty cheese, and a world famous music festival. It has plenty of coastline from sandy beaches to Jurassic sections packed with fossils, lush forests, and an abundance of historical buildings and heritage sites.

So, what exactly is Somerset Day about, and what is its history? Read on to find out more.

Somerset Day marks Alfred the Great's call to arms and the gathering of 'all the people of Somerset' to march against the invading Viking army, and is now an annual opportunity to celebrate all that is "great" about Somerset and its residents and communities.

Alfred is the only Monarch to have been called the Great and following his defeat of the Danes is regarded by many to be the first King of England. By the 890s Alfred's charters and coinage were referring to him as 'King of the English'.

The date was chosen by an online poll in 2015 in which over 8,000 people voted.

11th May features more than once among the milestones of Somerset history.

On 11th May 973 that St Dunstan, the Somerset-born Archbishop of Canterbury, conducted the coronation of King Edgar in Bath Abbey, an occasion of great significance in the history of the English crown.

This was the first coronation of an English king for which any kind of extended record survives and still forms the basis for the coronation service being used this month.

On 11th May 1645 the terrible second siege of Taunton ended when Royalist forces suddenly withdrew and the town was improbably held for Parliament.

It was a watershed in the Civil War and gave rise to a rhyme that was chanted in the streets of Taunton long afterwards: "Rejoice ye dogs 'tis the 11th of May, the day the Cavaliers ran away".

Fly the flag for King & County

The 2023 Somerset Day weekend, and the lead up to it, following on from the Coronation weekend, will be an opportunity to celebrate the 'gathering together of all the people of Somerset' for King and County, with many different events taking place

Remember Jesus Too



Writing about the celebration of Holy Communion almost eighty years ago, Gregory Dix posed the question 'Was ever another command so obeyed?' It's well worth searching online for his whole answer. An edited quote of his response reads:

'For century after century, spreading slowly to every continent and country and among every race on earth, this action has been done, in every conceivable human circumstance, for every conceivable human need. Men have found no better thing than this to do for kings at their crowning and for criminals going to the scaffold; for armies in triumph or for a bride and bridegroom in a little country church; for the wisdom of the Parliament of a mighty nation or for a sick old woman afraid to die; while the lions roared in the nearby amphitheatre; on the beach at Dunkirk. And best of all, week by week and month by month, on a hundred thousand successive Sundays, faithfully, unfailingly, across all the parishes of Christendom, the pastors have done this just to make the plebs sancta Dei—the holy common people of God.'

The first of Dix's scenarios will be played out before us at the coronation of King Charles III. At the heart of the ceremony, amidst all the pomp and circumstance, the oaths and declarations, the regalia and crowning, will be the celebration of Holy Communion. The words used will be just the same as those spoken in our parish churches Sunday by Sunday. From Communion, the King and Queen will be sent out from Westminster Abbey to live like us the prayer we say at the end of many of our services. They will offer 'their souls and bodies to be a living sacrifice, sent out in the power of [God's] Spirit to live and work to [God's] praise and glory.'

The command that the King, Queen and all of us obey is Jesus's direction to 'Do this in remembrance of me.' So, as you watch the Coronation please remember Jesus too. For he is the one who comes to us as a servant; the king of Kings.
