#### Are You the One?



One of my enduring memories as a student is witnessing the traditional Advent Procession in Durham's great Cathedral. It starts with the vast cathedral in complete darkness. Far away at the west end of the cathedral and on a lower level is the magnificent Galilee Chapel where the choir has assembled. It all begins when a solitary voice is heard intoning the opening line of The Matin Responsory; "I look from afar: and lo, I see the power

of God coming......" to which the choir responds; "...... Tell us art thou he that should come.....?" The singing continues as the choir mounts the steps leading up into the vast cathedral repeating the question "Art thou he that should come?" As they enter, their candles gradually bring light into the cathedral. Moving down the long nave they light the candles of those in the congregation until the whole cathedral is full of light.

In all the excitement leading up to Christmas (which commercially began in August) it is easy to lose sight of the true meaning behind the festival – the incarnation – and the question it presents to all of us; Is Jesus the one, the Messiah, the Saviour, the light of the world sent by God? To Christians the answer is clear but to many others, probably the great majority, it is a question yet to be seriously considered.

Many people question whether if Jesus is / was the Saviour of the world why is it still such a rotten place? Unlike the fairy in the Christmas advert Christians have no magic wand to change the world. It is only as people come to accept Jesus and his teaching and are willing to put it into practice that the world will begin to change.

Advent is often spoken of as a time of preparation for the 'second coming' when Jesus will return but St John in his gospel makes it clear we don't have to wait for the end of the world, the light is already here. It is just that most people either cannot or refuse to see it! This Christmas let us try to help people discover that light encouraged by the words of St John. "The light shines in the darkness and the darkness has never overcome it". (St John Chapter 1 v 5.)

#### **News from our Benefice**

#### **Celebration of Our Three Church Benefice**



On Sunday 29<sup>th</sup> October, members of all three churches, St John's, St James's and All Saints gathered together, to celebrate St John's becoming part of the Benefice, with a joint service of Holy Communion led by Reverend Andrew.

#### All Souls Service of Remembrance and Thanksgiving



We remembered those we have loved as we came together at our All Souls' Service on the afternoon of 29<sup>th</sup> October. We had a thoughtful time of singing, readings and poems and the opportunity to place stones bearing loved ones' names on the altar and later place then in the churchyard.

#### **Remembrance Sunday**

Services were held at each of our churches as our villages paid their respects to the fallen with the two-minute silence being kept at 11.00 am.

In Sandford people assembled at the memorial to lay wreaths and listen to the names of those who died. There were poignant displays of poppies and artefacts in the church as a reminder of those who served in conflicts past and present.





St James's was decorated with knitted poppies and filled to capacity for the service including over 40 young people representing Girl Guiding and Scouting in Winscombe. Scouts and guides also read the names of the fallen. Wreaths were laid on the altar before being placed on the churchyard War Memorial at the end of the service.

At St John's the service was led by Rev Warren Williams took at which a poppy wreath was placed on the two war memorial tablets in church and the two boys who lost their lives on Dolberrow Warren were remembered.

#### **Safeguarding Sunday**



Our Family Holy Communion service on 19<sup>th</sup> November marked 'Safeguarding Sunday'. This is a time when churches think about how they are supporting those who have been hurt or harmed and highlight and celebrate all the good work that is being done behind the scenes to protect vulnerable people and create safer cultures and communities for all both now and in the future. Reverend Jacqui, who is a Safeguarding Trainer for the Diocese, provided the reflection which included a Q&A session with one of our Parish Safeguarding Officers about the role.





#### **Lynch Chapel News**

Concerning this time of year, the poet John Keats wrote this phrase, 'Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness' and it succinctly sums up this time of year. Yellowing leaves on the ground, that sense of dampness, a feeling of being hemmed in, a time for being at home, being thankful for shelter, warmth and light, hot meals, and company.

As we draw near to the ending of another year, I am reminded that seasons and people come and go, but God remains the same ever faithful, ever true! I am constantly challenged by the words of Jesus to His disciples, "Love each other. Just as I have loved you, you should love each other. Your love for each other will prove to the world that you are my disciples." And in His prayer to the Father, "I pray that they will be one, just as you and I are one." Christians are often so obsessed by differences that the great desire of Jesus for unity is forgotten along with that we love each other!

I spend a lot of my time visiting people in their homes and have come to recognise how important hospitality is to the guest. I am always offered tea and, at times, food, or even occasionally, a meal. I have a colleague who has never liked hot drinks who has had to learn to accept the offers from those he visits. A hot cup of tea indicates that there can be more time spent together than a glass of water!

Occasionally I meet someone who absolutely loves to receive people into their home, it is their great gift, and you can easily identify the visible joy they feel when they have someone to stay!

My mother was one such person and I spent much of my childhood trying to remember the names of those who shared my breakfast table! They were invariably young Christian women and often they would stay for months! I cannot remember feeling any animosity towards them, but I now view those with the gift of hospitality like my Mum with awe!

There are some notable examples of hospitality to challenge and inspire us in the Bible: Abraham's words at the visit of the three strangers to his desert tent, "Let a little water be brought, and wash your feet, and rest yourselves under the tree." The apostle Peter was welcomed into homes. One example is recorded in the book of Acts in the words of an angel to Cornelius: "He (Peter) is lodging with one Simon, a tanner, whose house is by the sea." Paul's life was one of persecution, but he could write: "May the Lord grant mercy to the household of Onesiphorus, for he often refreshed me and was not ashamed of my chains." Even Jesus, the man who had nowhere He could call home, expressed his love for His friends in such a way: Jesus said to them, "Come and have breakfast."

I would like to encourage you to continue to show hospitality to each other, to express our love practically and to be prepared to welcome the person who lands on your doorstep with open arms.

#### The Twelve Days of Christmas.

Is there a hidden meaning behind the "Twelve Days of Christmas" song?

According to popular tradition, during a time in the 16<sup>th</sup> Century when Roman Catholics in England were not permitted to worship openly, 'The Twelve Days of Christmas' song was used to secretly pass on the ideology of Christianity. Each gift on the list symbolises a different aspect of the Christian faith:



**The Partridge in the Pear Tree** is Jesus Christ. A partridge often feigns injury to draw attention to itself and away from her young. Because of its self-sacrifice the partridge was used to represent Christ.

**The 2 Turtle Doves** are The Old and New Testaments. Because they have one mate for life the doves represent enduring relationships such as that between the Old and New Testaments.

**The 3 French Hens** stand for the Holy Trinity of father, Son and Holy Spirit. They can also represent Faith, Hope and Charity, the theological virtues.

The 4 Calling Birds are the four gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John

The 5 Golden Rings are the first five books of the Old Testament.

The 6 Geese A-laying are the six days of creation with the eggs representing new life.

**The 7 Swans A- Swimming** are the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit – Prophecy, Service, Teaching, Encouragement, Giving, Leadership and Mercy.

**The 8 Maids A-Milking** are the eight beatitudes which Jesus gave in the Sermon on the Mount.

**The 9 Ladies Dancing** are the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit – Love, Joy, peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness and Self- Control.

The 10 Lords A-Leaping stand for the law and leadership of the Ten Commandments.

**The 11 Pipers Piping** are the eleven faithful apostles.

The 12 Drummers Drumming are the twelve points of belief in the Apostle's Creed.

#### What is a Christingle Service?

It is a joyful family service that is named after the Christingles that are lit during the celebration.

Christingles are made from an orange (but in cider country here in Winscombe, we use an apple!) decorated with red tape, sweets and a candle.



Christingles began in the Moravian Church in Germany. At a children's service in Marienborn in 1747, Bishop Johannes de Watteville looked for a simple way to explain the happiness that had come to people through Jesus. He decided to give the children a symbol to do this. And in 1968, John Pensom of The Children's Society adapted the Christingle and introduced it to the Church of England.

And as we celebrate Christingle, we also have a collection to support The Children' Society and their work with children and young people in the darkest situations imaginable.

Our Christingle Service also looks forward to Christmas and is the first of the many family services that will happen in the Parish during the Christmas season.



#### **Have a Greener Christmas**

#### **Buy local**

Buying locally produced items minimises emissions and reduces your carbon footprint. Supporting local independent business also means that more of your money stays in the local economy and supports your community.

Use the shops in our villages, visit one of the many local Christmas markets or look at <a href="https://made.innorthsomerset.co.uk">https://made.innorthsomerset.co.uk</a> for local businesses and creatives.

#### **Cut the carbon footprint of presents**

You could do this by trying online pre-loved shops for second hand clothing, gifts, decorations and more.

Look in local charity shops for stocking fillers and items such as books, dvds, board games and puzzles.

#### Buy an experience or make a charitable donation

Consider buying vouchers for an activity or day out at a local attraction.

A charitable donation can also make a unique gift such as planting trees, sponsoring an animal or providing clean water. Several charities sell gift cards which support a particular cause.

#### **Buy Less**

Consider joining forces with other family members to buy one bigger, more meaningful gift for each person rather than individual ones.

#### Choose sustainable alternatives to wrapping paper

Wrapping paper cannot go in your recycling because most is mixed with unrecyclable items such as foil, glitter, ribbon and tape.

Consider an eco-friendly alternative such as plain brown paper which can be decorated with stamps, simple prints, drawing or just embellished with a label.

Your labels could be made by recycling last year's Christmas Cards.

#### **Messy Church Next Year**

You might ask: How can young families with school-age children learn about acknowledging and worshipping their loving Creator God, and about the Christian faith that their parents learnt?

We are blessed that in our villages the primary schools regularly welcome teams from our churches to provide Christian teaching and reflection in their weekly assemblies. There are good materials available for lay volunteers to use. If you want to hear more about the "Open the Book" materials used do contact Reverend Andrew or a member of the teams.

Messy Church has provided a local opportunity for families to engage together in child-friendly, fun worship activities. However, the event does need enough families to commit to coming. Without that, the format is ineffective.

In our beautiful villages there are many activities for 21<sup>st</sup> century families to choose from, and the number of families attending Messy Church has been lower for our last 2 sessions. So, we've decided not to continue a regular monthly session. In the spring we may consider a further "pop-up" Messy Church, possibly on the Saturday preceding Mothering Sunday. Prior to arranging this we'll take a poll of families who've attended Messy Church in the past to see if they would hope to come. Unless we get positive responses from 4 or 5 families the session won't run. We shall be happy to run future Messy Churches if there is feedback that the format seems valuable.

Our thanks to the faithful team of volunteers who have committed themselves to regularly facilitating the Messy Church Sessions for the past few years!

## A December Birthday Rudyard Kipling




Kipling was born in Bombay, India on December 30<sup>th</sup> 1865. He moved to England when he was 5 years old, living with a couple who boarded children of British nationals who were serving in India. Sadly, this was not a happy experience for him. He was later educated at a private boys' public boarding school a period he captured in his novel 'Stalky and Co'

He is probably best known as the author of 'The Jungle Book' 'Kim' the 'Just So Stories' and the poem 'If'.

By 1897, Rudyard Kipling was not only among the most acclaimed authors but also the highest paid writer in the world. In 1907 he won the prestigious Nobel Prize for Literature. He was the first English language writer to do so and also the youngest to do so to date.

Kipling's first name wasn't Rudyard. It was Joseph. The name Rudyard was taken from Rudyard Lake in Staffordshire, where his parents courted each other, and was his middle name. However, he was known by the name Rudyard and it was the altogether more distinctive.



Rudyard Kipling used the word 'grinch' over 60 years before Dr Seuss. The word 'grinch' was used by Rudyard Kipling in one of his poems. Dr Seuss would take up the word for his classic 1957 children's book, 'How the Grinch Stole Christmas'.

He also used the idea of the 'daemon' over half a century before Philip Pullman. Kipling claimed that a 'Daemon' helped him to write 'The Jungle Book', and in his final book, an autobiography, he wrote: 'When your Daemon is in charge, do not try to think consciously. Drift, wait, and obey.'

Kipling married Caroline Starr Balestier, an American, in January 1862 and the couple moved to her property in Vermont. They had three children, Josephine, Elsie and John but two of them died at an early age. In the winter of 1899, both Rudyard and Josephine fell gravely ill with pneumonia. While Rudyard was able to recover, his young daughter lost her life. During World War I, Kipling's son John wanted to join the British military but was rejected due to poor eyesight. However, Rudyard used his connections to get him enlisted with the Irish Guard as second lieutenant. John Kipling was killed in action in the First World War at the Battle of Loos in September 1915 at the age of 18 and Rudyard was left mourning the loss of another child.

Rudyard Kipling died on January 18<sup>th</sup>, 1936, at the age of 70. His obituary appeared in the newspaper two days before he died. He read it and responded to the publisher, 'I've just read that I am dead. Don't forget to delete me from your list of subscribers'!

#### **Trees for Free!**

#### **Supporting and Protecting our Natural World**

#### **Presents for Pollinators?**

It is impossible to understand the individual life cycle of the myriad seen and unseen creatures that live in our gardens, but they all need to survive the darker days of winter by various strategies. So really, it's best to leave well alone on the grounds that they instinctively know best.

Assuming that some pollinators have survived the winter and have not been the victims of cutting back, or even been thrown on a bonfire or stranded in a green bag, they will now start to emerge from wherever they have been hiding and begin their desperate search for food that is both pollen for protein and nectar (sugar and water) for energy.

Here we can help for although few plants flower in late winter or early spring, we can add to those that do, especially by planting in groups so that less energy is lost by flying long distances from flower to flower and even to find the flowers at all.

We also spend more time indoors now. Various catalogues arrive and now is the time to plan for the coming year and choose plants that might be Christmas presents for us *and* pollinators. Such live presents are likely to give years of pleasure as well as providing sustenance for insects, birds, small mammals and indirectly to amphibians.

Noticeably our climate is changing with milder winters so that pollinators may well venture out in December, January and February in search of food. The energy involved in the search may well lead to death. Therefore, let us look at some early flowering perennials, bulbs, shrubs and trees. Trees provide the most nectar and pollen because of their size.

My favourite early flowering plant is Hellebore orientalis. This picture was taken on January 23<sup>rd</sup>. 2022. The flowers are single with easy access to pollen and nectar. They withstand frost, even snow and flower over several months. They are virtually disease free and grow well in shade. Their large leaves suppress weeds. They also self-seed freely.



Spring bulbs are always an asset to the garden and to pollinators particularly snowdrops, crocus and aconites. Some varieties of snowdrop may flower for Christmas.

A honeybee is enjoying food. Again, the single flowers are easily accessible with visible pollen.





If possible, a tree is a welcome pollinator plant. The earliest are willows. There is a huge variety and individuals are available to flower from January until June. This one (left) was in flower and providing food in mid-January.

Lastly an evergreen early flowering shrub is Mahonia. It has a delicate fragrance from racaemes of yellow flowers. They tolerate shade so light up a dull corner just when it is most needed! There are many varieties.

I wish everybody a Happy Christmas and peaceful New Year and hope some plant presents arrive!

#### **NOVEMBER EVENTS**

On Monday 6<sup>th</sup> November the Branch Meeting was held in the Bell Inn, Evercreech. Members met for coffee followed by an excellent and interesting presentation on 'The Hungarian Army Air Corps' by Captain Tibor Erdesz who spoke with authority from his experience. Tibor joined the Hungarian Military College in 1988 and graduated 3 years later in the rank of Lieutenant as a helicopter engineer. He joined the MH 87th Combat Helicopter Regiment as a helicopter structure and engine technician. His regiment operated a range of helicopters but most famously the Mi-24 'Hind' helicopter.

Tibor gave an excellent brief on the design, weapons, role and maintenance of the Mi-24 'Hind' including deployment in Afghanistan while participating in NATO's Afghan mission since 2003, but this activity reached a new level in 2010. During the Afghan Air Force's acquisition of Mi-24 helicopters, Hungarian (pilots and technical) personnel assisted the Afghans in their training. Tibor left the military in 1995 but continued his association with Hungarian military helicopters.







Members then took part in an open discussion about the role and function of the RAFA Mid-Somerset Branch for the future before they enjoyed a lunch and drink chosen from the Bell Inn menu and bar.



#### **Gardening Notes for December**

#### **Cornus (Dogwoods)**



Wild dogwoods are revealed in our hedgerows when the leaves fall providing a colourful display. Those growing in hedgerows are our native species Cornus Sanguinea but others, with more impressive colours, are forms of its North American cousin Cornus Sericea and Cornus Alba. All Cornus are happiest in lime rich soil (chalk or clay), so are ideal for growing in this area.

Cornus are grown for their colourful stems in winter and to get the best results it is all about pruning. They need to be pruned hard in spring just as the leaf buds are showing green, as the

most colourful stems are produced in the current year, although I prefer to leave about 20% of the current year's growth which produces a taller plant. By pruning these hard each year, the plants use up the nutrients in the soil, so apply a general fertiliser in the spring and mulch in the autumn every couple of years. December is an ideal time for planting Cornus - as with any shrub dig a hole wider than the pot and make sure any compaction at the sides and the base of the hole is broken up. Do not add any compost as this only encourages the roots to stay in the planting hole rather than grow out into the soil. Firm in well and give a good soak before applying a mulch.

Cornus come in red, orange, yellow, green and almost black colourings, here are some examples:

- Cornus Bailey unusually vigorous with reddish brown winter twigs and among the best autumn leaf colour
- Cornus Eleganlissima one of the most popular varieties with white edged leaves, bright red winter stems and white fruit
- Cornus Flaviramea often slender stems of yellowish green, happy in wet soil
- Cornus Kisselringii one of the darkest, the stems are almost black, red young shoots and purplish autumn colour
- Cornus Magic Flame fiery orange twigs tipped with red, are revealed when the equally fiery autumn leaves fall

#### Some Jobs to do this month:-

- 1. Cut all last season's hellebore foliage back to ground level to reveal the new flower stems and to keep the blotchy fungal disease hellebore leaf spot at bay.
- 2. Use secateurs to cut back autumn fruiting raspberry canes.
- 3. Clean your lawnmower. Remove any debris that has built up under the hood, soak packed on grass clippings and after drying spray on a film of oil.

#### SANDFORD & DISTRICT GARDENING CLUB



John Dunster welcomed the members and introduced speaker Rob Handy who gave us a most humorous talk and showed us photos of his garden.

Rob bought a two-and-a-half-hectare piece of land in Chew Magna for £10,000. His dream was to be self-sufficient and grow all his own food. He set about clearing some land and build

himself a yurt to live in. He then started planting a forest garden, where he grows large fruit trees, nut trees, dwarf fruit trees. He then built a few ponds. Rob grows a wide

variety of edible perennial vegetables, a lot of which we hadn't even heard of, but he told us they are delicious! The perennial beds are surrounded by meadow land. He keeps chickens and ducks and also geese to keep away the foxes. In his greenhouse he grows grapes, peaches, lemons, avocados and apricots he said he has a high yield from a small space.



John asked Rob to judge this month's competition and he chose a vase of beautiful autumn foliage which was created by Bridget Andrews.



Thank you so much to those who were so generous.





#### **OCTOBER SHOUTS**

In October there were 15 'Shouts' between our four Lifeboat Stations (Burnham-on-Sea -4, Minehead -3, Portishead -3, W-s-M -5).

At 17:40 on Monday 30<sup>th</sup> October, the Coastguard paged a request to launch both Weston lifeboats to assist the Burnham Lifeboat team (that had already launched both their lifeboats), in a search for a missing adult male near Burnham Pier. Both lifeboats joined Burnham's two lifeboats as well as two rescue helicopters. The Atlantic crew were at sea for a staggering 7 hours and on the smaller D-class, the crews were swapped at Burnham-on-Sea mid-way through the operation.

An extensive search was undertaken of the shoreline, estuaries of the Rivers Brue and Parret and surrounding riverbanks, but nothing was found. This was a great example of a multiagency operation involving two of our lifeboat stations, four of our lifeboats, several crews, the Maritime & Coastguard Agency Shore Team and two of their helicopters.

After mooring the Atlantic B class, the Weston crew returned to station at 00:30 with the D class rehoused and readied again for service by 01:45.

#### **A Unique Story**



When I speak to my Mum on my birthday, she often recalls to me the events that surrounded my arrival in the world. These include nearly being born in the hospital lift, my older brother being smuggled in to see me under my dad's overcoat and of various aunts sneaking onto the maternity ward out of visiting hours by wearing their WRVS uniforms.

Each of us has a unique story about our birth. At Christmas we'll be recounting once again the story that we share about another birth - the birth of Jesus. Across the world we'll be re-telling and re-enacting what happened in Bethlehem more than 2000 years ago. We'll recall the journey of Mary and Joseph, the birth in the stable, the arrival of the shepherds, the song of the angels, the visit of the Magi.

Our own birth stories are unique to each of us. The birth story of Jesus is common to us all. And not just because we all know about it. For in our recollection of Jesus' birth, we will also be remembering that that, in him, God came to be at one with us. In Jesus God arrived to share fully in our humanity, experiencing complete solidarity with every aspect of our human condition. Jesus is 'God with us' — in trenches in Ukraine, bomb shelters in Israel and Gaza, in hospital wards where loved ones die, in relationships where there is conflict and distress.

Just as much as he is with us in our greatest joys and our deepest woes, Jesus is also for us. One of the earliest teachers of the Church said this: 'He became what we are so that we might become what he is.' The baby born in Bethlehem stands with us not only in all that we experience. This child also comes to offer us the possibility of opening every part of our lives to the transforming power of God's life of love and joy and peace. He comes so that every day we can become a little more like him.

This is the good news of Christmas and may it be yours this year.

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
