What the World Needs Now.



As we begin February, I am sure there are many young (and older) people looking forward to Valentine's Day. But who was the Saint Valentine that this special day has been named after? Well, no-one really knows for certain. However, there are two stories of men called Valentine whom the day may be named after.

Both were priests in the third century and were executed on 14th February in different years. The first was arrested for defying a Roman decree that forbade soldiers to marry. He was executed for the crime of continuing to marry soldiers who were in love.

The second story is that an imprisoned priest fell in love with one of his visitors and began writing letters to her. Just before his execution he signed his last letter to her, 'From your Valentine'.

Whether either of these, or any other stories are true, we can still be sure that 14th February is almost definitely named after a martyred Saint Valentine and is a day we associate with love.

The word 'love' can be found 310 times in the King James version of the Bible and between 500 and 750 times in more modern versions. In English we just have the one word, 'love', but there are three Greek words used in the Bible that have slightly different meanings — 'eros' which is a romantic love; 'philos' which is warm affection or friendship and 'agape' — the sacrificial, unconditional love that God has for each one of us.

On St Valentine's Day we probably concentrate more on the 'eros' type of love but, perhaps, on that day, and every day, we should think more about the 'agape' kind of love.

In John's Gospel, Jesus tells us, 'To love one another as I have loved you'. Jesus loved us so much that he gave his life for us. We, most probably, in this country, are not called to give our life for others, although in many other countries this is happening. So, how can we show this 'agape' love to others? Every one of us can do this in some simple way – a kind word, a helping hand, generosity, hospitality, forgiveness and in so many more ways.

Burt Bacharach and Hal David wrote a wonderful song in the 1960's recorded by Dionne Warwick among others. The lyrics begin – 'What the world needs now is love, sweet love. It's the only thing that there's just too little of. What the world needs now is love, sweet love, not just for some but for everyone'.

Our world today is desperately in need of God's 'agape' love. Let's think and pray about how we can share that 'agape' love in whatever way we can.

Lynch Chapel News

You may have experienced the challenge recently of roof tiles on your home falling off due to the high winds we have experienced, or fence panels becoming uprooted. The power of the wind is amazing! I recall walking on the Brecon Beacons in my youth and as I reached near to the summit of Pen y Fan, the highest point in that area, it was so windy that I couldn't stand up: I had to crawl to the Ordnance Survey marker!

We have had some windy days recently and this has brought to mind the double meaning of 'Ruach' in the Bible. This word not only means wind, but also Spirit. In Hebrew the Holy Spirit is the Holy Wind. As I found in my mountain scrambles, it is very hard to walk against the wind and it is tiring and exhausting to walk against the direction the Holy Spirit is wanting to take you. Jonah is the classic example of someone who tried and look what happened to him!

You may recall the words of Jesus to Nicodemus, recorded in the third chapter of John's gospel: "Very truly I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God unless they are born of water and the Spirit. Flesh gives birth to flesh, but the Spirit gives birth to spirit. You should not be surprised at my saying, 'You must be born again.' The wind blows wherever it pleases. You hear its sound, but you cannot tell where it comes from or where it is going. So, it is with everyone born of the Spirit."

You may well be asking yourself the perfectly valid question: "How do I know when I am doing things in agreement with the Holy Spirit?" The Holy Spirit always blows in the direction of the Holy, the pure, the sacred. If you are attempting to commit yourself to unholy thoughts or actions, then you will be competing against the Holy Spirit's work in your life. Once you repent and turn around then your life becomes so much easier, because you have the power and strength of the Holy Spirit behind you. When you walk in the Spirit, life changes from being a drag to becoming a breeze!

WORLD DAY OF PRAYER

'I BEG YOU, BEAR WITH ONE ANOTHER IN LOVE'

This year's World Day of Prayer Service has been prepared by the women of Palestine and is being hosted by All Saints Church, Sandford.

World Day of Prayer is an international, inter-church organisation which enables us to hear the thoughts of women from all parts of the world: their hopes, concerns and prayers.

Taiwan is an island rich in natural resources and culturally diverse. During the service the women of Taiwan will share the issues they face geographically, politically and socially and also their hopes for the future.



This painting 'Praying Palestinian Women' created by artist, Halima Aziz, shows three women partying together in a peaceful, outdoor space.

Halima has used motifs and symbols which indicate the origin and cohesiveness of these women.

Olive trees are a sign of everlasting and abundant life because they can live for thousands of years. The Palestinian people are deeply rooted in their country and this is underlined by the golden roots of the tree. Poppy flowers are abundant and meaningful as they are a reminder of loved ones who have given their lives for their country. Traditional Palestinian dress such as the tatreez (embroidery), thobe (dress) or the white scarf symbolise the people's creativity and their country's rich heritage.

Let us join with the women of Palestine as they reflect on continuing challenging times, encouraging them to keep searching for a deeper understanding among all people who share the land, trusting and hoping in the humanity of one another.

The Day of Prayer is celebrated in over 120 countries. It begins in Samoa and prayer in native languages travels throughout the world before finishing in American Samoa some 38 hours later.





Pancake Fun!

In 2024 Shrove Tuesday or Pancake Day will fall on Tuesday 13th February. Here are a few fun facts about pancakes!





- ❖ In Britain we use 52 million eggs on Pancake Day. That's 22 million more than any other day!
- The record for the most pancake flips in two minutes is 349! Can you beat that this year? The highest pancake toss reached 329 cm high!
- ❖ The largest pancake ever made weighed about three tonnes and measured almost 15 metres across.
- In Iceland, people eat salted meat and peas instead of pancakes on Shrove Tuesday.
- In France and the U.S.A. Pancake Day is called Mardi Gras which means 'Fat Tuesday'. In France, people like to make a wish before flipping their pancakes. They do this while holding a coin in their other hand.
- On Pancake Day in Finland, people eat green pea soup and pastries.
- ❖ How about an unusual Shrove Tuesday fact? Before baking powder was invented, people would use fresh snow in the pancakes instead! This is because it contains a chemical called ammonia which helps the pancakes to come out fluffy and soft.



- ❖ In Germany, Pancake Day is called "Fastnacht" which means "eve of the fast".
- William Shakespeare loved pancakes, and there are pancakes written into two of his plays - All's Well That Ends Well and As You Like It. Shakespeare's Shrove Tuesday would have been a little different to yours however, dinner was at midday, not in the evening, and pancakes would follow dinner rather than be the main course.



- The first pancake recipe recorded was in an English cookbook from the 15th Century that's over 500 years ago!
- ❖ Andrei Smirnoff from Russia ate 73 pancakes in one hour. That's more than one a minute and the Guinness World Record for the most pancakes served in eight hours is 34,818.

A February Birthday: Charles Dickens



Charles Dickens was born on 7th 1812 in Portsmouth. Renowned for portraying the gruesome truths about Victorian England and the perils of Britain's social class system, his unprecedented celebrity made him the most popular novelist of his century, and since then Dickens's books have never been out of print. Here are some interesting facts you may not know about him

Dickens was forced to work at a young age at Warren's Blacking Warehouse along the River Thames, pasting labels onto the pots used for shoe polish. He later found work as a junior clerk in a law office, studied shorthand and started working as a reporter.

He doesn't have anything to do with the phrase 'What the Dickens?' Which dates back to at least Shakespearean times. Dickens in the phrase means devil.

America was not his favourite place. "I can do nothing that I want to do, go nowhere where I want to go, and see nothing that I want to see," he complained in a letter about his U.S. travels. "If I turn into the street, I am followed by a multitude."

Dickens perfected the cliffhanger ending. Many of his novels were initially written in monthly or weekly instalments, so he needed to encourage readers to buy the next episode.

He had pet ravens, one of whom appears as a character in Barnaby Rudge. One of his ravens is said to have inspired Edgar Allen Poe's poem, 'The Raven'.

Dickens had his cat's paw stuffed. He once declared 'What greater gift than the love of a cat?' When his cat, Bob, died in 1862, Dickens had his paw stuffed and mounted on an ivory letter opener engraved 'C.D. In memory of Bob 1862.'

Dickens was a prodigious wordsmith, known to create words and phrases of his own such as butter-fingers, flummox, the creeps, dustbin, ugsome, so angular and more!

He started a home for fallen women and was involved in its management.

He was a Victorian Ghostbuster! In common with several other authors he was a member of the Ghost Club a group that attempted to investigate supposed supernatural encounters.

He wrote more Christmas stories than just A Christmas Carol such as The Chimes and the Cricket on the Hearth.

A train crash nearly derailed him in 1865 when travelling home from France. Dickens helped to rescue stranded passengers when their carriage was left dangling from the tracks over a bridge.

Dickens was buried in Westminster Abbey against his wishes. The Dean of Westminster wanted a famous writer to be buried in Poet's Corner.

Supporting and Protecting Our Natural World A Joyful Coincidence.

This month it's me who will be supported and protected by the natural world as I enjoy a walk in Sandford Woods. I call it 'Thanksgiving Wood'.

The wonder of the world, the beauty, The power, the shapes of things their Colours, lights and shades, these I saw Look ye also while life lasts.

Quote from 'The Little Grey Men.' by BB (pen name of Denys Watkins)

My favourite path runs east west along the northern edge of Sandford Woods. About halfway along is a fallen tree trunk that makes a most comfortable seat. I often sit for quite a time. At first it is silent but steadily and surely the previous occupants return - blackbirds, wrens, blue tits jays and robins to reclaim their territory unaware of me. Just to the right, no more than twenty feet away is a small hollow in which I hope to see a deer.

On this day I saw a roe deer with the typical white rump watching us directly. She seemed unconcerned so I watched and waited. She watched too as she continued browsing. Eventually she decided to bound up the slope and then I noticed that she had a fawn with her that immediately followed. I had been completely unaware of the second deer.



I was reluctant to leave. Nevertheless I made for Marilyn's seat. Marilyn was a wonderful friend of mine who sadly died from breast cancer in 2006. We used to walk daily in the woods with our dogs. Her husband asked my stepson, Tom, to make a special seat in memory of Marilyn and her two dogs Max and Brandy. It is an ideal place to rest and for Sky, the beloved Border Collie that accompanies me, to have a treat.





As I walked on, King's Mine came into sight.

These branches mark the entrance to King Mine! It is included in the Mendip Cave Registry and Archive at ST4301 5937. It is very near the footpath. Below the 'cover' is a drop of 7.5 metres. This was a mine working but at the shaft's foot is a chamber 6 metres high, 7 metres wide and 15 metres long.

The mine was rediscovered in 2005 by Dave Upperton, who named it in honour of his friend, Lieutenant Tony King who was horribly killed in the 2003 Iraq War in his early twenties — still full of life and hope. Both these young men attended Churchill Academy. It was my great pleasure to teach Tony geography.

This walk is unfailingly life affirming. I can say, 'In the woods you can lose yourself or find yourself.'

Shipham, Rowberrow & Star History Society.

Our first meeting of the New Year was an invitation to our members to bring along something of their own and tell the others about it. Called 'Show and Tell' it proved to be quite a social occasion with everyone interested in the various items and their background stories.

Among the items were some beautifully embroidered cigarette cards, circa 1930; a Cobbler's Last which illustrated how all the trades came together in days gone by to ensure that small communities could cater to their own needs; a small ceramic pot from a London company which contained an ointment to cure everything from a sore head to bad legs! More local items were two clay jugs made by Powells of Bristol.

A very poignant photo was of three generations of firemen from the Taylor family - grandfather, father and son – and this came with the history of the Fire Service. The current Chairman, who was a policeman with the Bristol Constabulary, also told of his time 'on the front line' during some brutal strikes.

One slightly bizarre item was a postcard from 1889 which was given to one of our members. It was sent by someone in London to a resident of Shipham. Intrigued by the backstory to this, our member traced its history and finally discovered how the sender and recipient had met. A long journey and a truly amazing story!



Gardening Notes for February

Galanthus (Snowdrops)



As snowdrop flowers fade, spread the plants through borders by dividing large established clumps and then replanting them. If you are growing these for the first-time plants can be obtained by mail order at this time of the year, in the green. Choose a place with a little winter sun or at least some brightness; the site should be cool, shaded and not too dry, the soil moisture retentive and

organic rich. Snowdrops do best with minimal competition, keep away from vigorous plants or anything especially leafy, while they are in growth.

Growing tomatoes from seed

February is a good time to sow plants to grow in the greenhouse; you will need a heated propagator. Sow seeds in a modular tray made up of small cells, sowing a couple of seeds in each one, after germination reduce to one plant. Only lightly cover the seeds and stand the trays in water before placing in the propagator. Once they have their first true leaves, pot them up into 3-inch pots, burying them as deep as the first set of leaves. If in compost, the

hairs on the stems will grow into roots. After about 3 to 4 weeks pot on into 5-inch pots and by mid-April they can either be planted in the border in the greenhouse or in 10 litre pots sunk into the border enabling you to gain extra height. Each plant needs a strong cane to tie to for support. At all times the plants need protection against frost which means the greenhouse might need heating.



Pruning Roses

Most roses benefit from pruning, as it will improve health, flowering and the plant's longevity. Roses are best pruned in late winter and early spring just as they are coming into growth. Early flowering ramblers are the exception; they should be pruned after flowering has finished.


Hybrid tea: Leave 4 to 6 stems – shorten to about 5 buds from the base. **Floribunda:** Leave 6 to 8 stems – shorten to about 7 buds from the base.

Modern shrub roses: Reduce height by about 1/3rd and remove any stems that are weak or congested.


Climbrana Davis and 1 and 2 aldens

Climbers: Prune out 1 or 2 older stems and shorten side-shoots to 3 buds.

Ramblers: Remove up to half the older stems and shorten side-shoots to 3 buds.



Cuts should be about 5mm above an outward facing bud. Buds may not be obvious, so look for a horizontal line on one side of the stem, this is a node, and cut just above. With all roses remove any dead, crossing or damaged stems.


The meeting then reviewed the autumn 2023 programme and the morning concluded with a pub lunch and drinks.


FUTURE PROGRAMME

Just as the barrier was lifted and the launch rig started to make its way to the water's edge they were stood down. Thankfully once again, the person had been found safe and well.

Our Precious Gift

As Christians, while we may look to reduce our own carbon footprint, we are called to be stewards and witnesses of a much more radical resource. The clue is in the word 'ecology'.

'Eco' comes from the Greek word oikos, meaning house, or dwelling place. Ecology is partly about our responsibility to recognise the precious gift of the Earth, as our dwelling place: to be thankful, and play

our part. God made humankind to care for the earthly world: Jesus amplifies the call, as He uses 'nature' as the sign of how we can live in order to flourish and to fulfil God's will.

'Logy' comes from a Greek word logos interpreted as reason, the ordering of knowledge, logic. In John's Gospel, logos is a word to describe Jesus — through whom all things are made and from whom all true knowledge comes. Logos is the word, the source of all goodness and grace, for every human life, and for all of creation.

It is the 'logos', the word, who inhabits our lives, our creation – inviting us to recognise His light, and allow it to overcome the darkness of our own limited concerns and agendas. We meet the logos in scripture, in worship, in prayer, and deeper reflection.

In Jesus, as logos, we can find the wisdom, the resources and the commitment to play our part in caring for creation. We are able to invite others to recognise the deeper truths about Eco, our common dwelling place, and to see more clearly how we join with others to work out what to do, how to live, and honour the gift of life that we receive through Him. The Logos is the possibility of good news for humankind and for the Earth.

What a responsibility each Christian disciple is called to bear! And what grace can be ours to enable us to fulfil our calling and help all of God's children become caught up in the praise and prayer that gives true life to our dwelling place, and to exercise our stewardship appropriately.

Read John 1v1-14. Become an ECO-warrior – committed to our common dwelling place – through celebrating the power and presence of the LOGOS. ECOLOGY: we know it makes sense.

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
