A Challenge Offered



There's a fascinating exercise I've often undertaken with roomfuls of church members. I've asked them the question 'To what age do you trace back the beginnings of your Christian faith?' The results are almost always the same. About 40% of us think that our Christian journey started at some point before the age of four. Another 40% of us trace the beginnings of our faith back to when we were less than eleven. A further 20% say before we were eighteen. While only one in five of us report having embarked on the journey of faith as adults.

The findings I've described should give us all pause for thought. For most people, the start of our Christian

journey (even if we've dropped out for a while in adolescence and early adulthood) starts in childhood.

So, if we want to grow our churches and transform our communities this suggests that it's into the faith development of children and young people that we should be putting our energies, priority and resources.

Our data suggests that more than half our churches have no young person worshipping with them on a Sunday morning. I realise, of course, how hard it is for churches to compete with the demands of football, seeing the extended family, doing any of the many things that are otherwise crowded out of busy family lives. Yet experience shows that when we offer worship at other times and in formats that are attractive to children, young people and families they do come.

This year I'm challenging all our benefices to grow their average weekly attendance by one child (net). If we could sustain such an achievement over a number of years the impact would transform our churches, our lives and our experience.

The support services of our diocese offer extensive assistance to enable local churches to think what could work with the resources you have, the passions and skills you possess and the reality of the situation where you are. Do ask for their help. Are you willing to take up the challenge I've offered?






Ringers' Painting

2024 marks the 40^{th} anniversary of the large oil painting (4ft x 6ft [1.2m x 1.8m]) of the Winscombe Bellringers by local artist Ros Cuthbert. It was painted on the occasion of the restoration of the bells in 1982 and took a year to complete.

The painting featured in an art exhibition held in a marquee at the Community Centre in 1985 as part of a four-year fund-raising effort by the Ringers. Money was raised by the Ringers for this project by also organising other events such as exemption dog shows and a flower festival. Contributions to the project were also received from Ringers and a number of parishioners who each covenanted a sum of money over a period of 4 years ending in 1986.








In 2022 Ros was informed that the painting was being offered for sale at an auction in Cumbria and the Ringers felt that here was an opportunity to save this part of our village history for posterity. Parishioners, well-wishers and ringers (a number of them contributors to the original restoration) were invited to help with the purchase, and together with a substantial and very welcome grant from the Friends of St. James' Winscombe, the painting was eventually secured at an on-line auction. The painting was purchased with the intent that it should be put on public display on church premises. However, an acceptable location could not be found, and the Ringers have placed it for safety in the Church Tower ringing chamber where it is now hung from fixings originally used many years ago for candles or lanterns. The Ringers would be pleased show visitors the painting, but they must, for safety reasons, be accompanied by a Ringer.

Christian Aid Week 2024 - 12th to 18th May

Seven days, so many ways to make a difference

Every Christian Aid Week, people across Britain and Ireland raise funds, act and pray for their global neighbours in a celebration of hope for a fairer world.



This year's appeal is focussing on the organisation's work in Burundi, one of the most densely populated and poorest countries in Africa. The global cost of living crisis has intensified the challenges: more than 70 per cent of the population live in poverty and more than half of children are chronically malnourished.

Christian Aid has been working in Burundi since 1995 when it first offered humanitarian assistance to people surviving the civil conflict. Now, alongside local partners, the organisation helps establish Village Savings and Loans Associations (VSLAs). These groups mean people can save and borrow money, offering reliable and diverse incomes so families can eat regularly, get medicine when they need it, and build safer homes.

Thirty-five-year-old Aline Nibogora is the chairperson of a VSLA which supports some 25 families. Aline escaped an abusive marriage only to find herself on the streets begging for a place to stay. Her life changed when she went to a three-day, Christian Aid funded community workshop. With a small loan, Aline began trading avocados and peanuts. She's now a grocery wholesaler and building a home for her family.

"I don't want my children to have a painful life like mine, remembering it makes me weep. I could never have dreamed I would one day have a brick house and be a successful businesswoman, able to feed and clothe my children. This is a plan and I will do it; I am a woman who is an achiever."

This Christian Aid Week supporters are once more stepping up, knowing that every prayer, every gift, every action helps transforms lives.

£5 could buy a savings book for a member of a VSLA, setting them up to start their own small business and become finically independent.



Supporting and Protecting Our Natural World

Anticipation

It is always a good time of the year waiting for the spring to come and just anticipating what is to come.

The Common Purple Orchid

When I first realised that I had a hidden meadow here at 'Hillview' it was very, very exciting as more and more wildflowers appeared apparently from nowhere once I had stopped the sheep from grazing in the field.

Most surprising were the orchids, common I know. They were the Common Purple Orchid but stunningly beautiful. In 2014 I counted just 3 in the bottom northeast corner of the field. There were seven the next year, 17 the next year and so on until now there are just too many to count. They have also spread to the adjoining field just a few at a time.



First to appear is a rosette of deep green leaves with deep purple oval splodges.

When the flowers first open in early spring, their sweet smell attracts bees and other insects to pollinate them, despite having no nectar. The flowers are designed to attract pollinators. There may be up to 50 flowers on a tall spike that have a hood like

structure above and a 3 lobed lip at the base on which the pollinator can land and gain access to the flower. Once fertilised, the smell becomes unpleasant.

How do these orchids spread, always in small clusters and not too far away from each other? This is another wonder of nature. Nothing to do with humans.

The seeds are tiny, no bigger than a speck of dust, the tiniest seeds in the world. Vast numbers of the spindle shaped seeds are dispersed by wind. They are so light because they have an embryo and a small amount of protein, but the rest (80%), is air. There are no stores of food to rely on until the first leaves are out and able to make food by photosynthesis. There is no simple root, shoot or seed leaf. One seed capsule can contain 5000 seeds and the whole plant produces about 90 000 seeds.



Therefore, the seed must have an alternative way of germinating. It seems fantastic but the seed not only needs to fall on a place with just the right conditions of soil, light and moisture it must also form a relationship with a mychorizal fungus that lives under the ground and penetrates the seed and its embryo with a fine thread called a hypha to provide the seed with water and nutrients There's more! The seed can only generate in the dark. Therefore, it has to be trampled on or washed below the soil's surface. Quite a feat of survival!



Scattering huge numbers of seeds, with the wind, increases the chance for at least some of the seeds to find their specific fungal partner. Long distance dispersal means that the same amount of seed is spread over a larger area which would actually lower the odds of finding a compatible fungal partner in a suitable location. Thus, orchids are found separate but relatively close to each other because the chances of finding a host fungus is greater. Though this propagation method seems wasteful the plant has not had to spend very much energy on producing seeds so instead can produce prodigious numbers.







Birth Flowers and Birth Stones May

Lily of the Valley

One of the most fragrant scents of spring belongs to May's birth flower, Lily of the Valley. Lily of the Valley is associated with meanings in different cultures and across different eras.



According to ancient astrology, this flower was under the protection of the son of the goddess Maia. For the Greeks, this god was Hermes and for the Romans it was Mercury.

Another legend tells of a Lily of the Valley who fell in love with a nightingale's song, so it bloomed only when the bird returned to the woods in May and the Victorians believed that Lily of the Valley represented 'a return to happiness'.

In Germanic mythology, Lily of the Valley flowers have been associated with humility and purity and in Christian legend Eve's tears turned into Lillies of the Valley as she was expelled from the Garden of Eden. The flower is seen as a sign of Christ's second coming and is mentioned many times in the bible including the Gospel of St. Matthew Chapter 6: "And why are you anxious about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow: they neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these."

In the garden Lily of the Valley grows best in moist, fertile soils and is happiest in part to full shade. It can, however, spread rapidly! It is also toxic; every part is poisonous – root, stems, leaves and flowers.

So even though Lily of the Valley appears dainty and represents happiness, humility and sweetness, it can be deceiving and even dangerous!

The Emerald



The birthstone for May is the Emerald. The word 'emerald' comes from the Latin 'esmaralda' and 'esmaraldus' meaning 'green gem'. The colour is fitting for springtime and renewal representing new life after winter.


The Ancient Egyptians adored the gem so much they dedicated it to Venus, the goddess of love and beauty and it was Cleopatra's favourite.

Legend has it that the wearer of emeralds can see into the future.

An emerald is known for its beautiful and mesmerising green colour, which varies from light green to a deeper rare intense green-blue.

The gemstone symbolises youth, rebirth, wisdom, success in love and good fortune. representing fidelity, goodness and love

Today, most emerald gemstones are mined in Columbia, Zambia and Brazil.



MARCH SHOUTS

In March there were 11 'shouts' between our four Lifeboat Stations (Burnham-on-Sea 1, Minehead – 1, Portishead – 5, W-s-M - 4).

On the evening of Monday 16th March, Milford Haven Coastguard tasked Weston-super-Mare lifeboat to launch to reports of a fisherman in the water near Birnbeck pier. On approaching the site an update was received that the casualty was clinging to rocks just above the water. Weston-super-Mare Coastguard Rescue Team was able to use torches to highlight the exact location of the casualty and two boat crew were put ashore, where they were able to get to the casualty and move him to the lifeboat. At this point the male lost consciousness and was given emergency first aid in the boat as it returned to the slipway at speed.

Due to a high-water tide, the helm was able to bring the boat to the top of the slipway where the casualty was attended to by the RNLI doctor before the ambulance and paramedics arrived and took over. The casualty regained consciousness and was transferred to hospital, from where he has since made a full recovery; this was a successful rescue involving multi agencies and some great teamwork.


RNLI LIFEBOAT CREWS AND LIFEGUARDS SAVED 355 LIVES IN 2023

On Monday 8th April, the RNLI released its operational figures for 2023, revealing that the charity's lifeboat crews and lifeguards saved a total of 355 lives last year – almost one life saved for every day of the year.

The data, captured between January and December 2023, highlights the continuing demand for the services of RNLI volunteer lifeboat crews, with 9,192 lifeboat launches over the course of the year. RNLI volunteer crew members saved the lives of 269 people over the course of 2023, while the RNLI beach lifeguards saved 86 lives.


Magician or Miracle Maker?


Who is Jesus and why does he matter?

Gardening Notes for May

Deadheading Tulips

Some varieties of tulips will flower year on year, while some are less reliable, however, to make sure that you give them every chance of providing a good display for next year remove all the faded flowers, so preventing the heads taking the plant's energy, leave the foliage to die down naturally.



Feeding Plants

Plants in containers will require a weekly feed using a low nitrogen liquid fertiliser, allocate the same day each week, which we call feeding day.

Basil and Parsley

Now is the time to grow basil and parsley from seed. Fill pots or trays with multi-purpose compost and flatten the surface, sprinkle the seed over the compost and cover with a fine layer of compost. Place the pots in a tray of water until the compost is wet on the surface and place in the warmth. When the seedlings are large enough to handle, plant them on into small pots and eventually transfer them into a larger container.

Plant Supports

The secret of supporting plants is to do it before they need rescuing as they will never really recover, so it is important to do it now before the plants become too tall. By doing it early the plants will grow up through the supports which will become hidden. Various metal supports are available as well as using hazel twigs or canes for individual plants such as lilies or delphiniums. It is most important to support plants like peonies, although the flower stems are not all that tall their blooms are very heavy and the stems tend to drop to the ground particularly when it rains.

Pot up Tomatoes



Use large deep pots or buckets with drainage holes, fill with potting compost and mix in some granular fertiliser as tomatoes are hungry plants. Soak the plants well and plant up to the bottom set of leaves, the extra length of stem buried under the surface will produce more roots, insert a cane for support.

Hanging Baskets

Choose a hanging basket at least 35cm in diameter and plant up using good quality compost with added slow-release fertiliser and moisture retaining gel. Be generous with the planting and if you are using trailing plants there is no need to plant up the sides of the basket as these will soon be covered. After planting leave the compost slightly lower towards the centre to form a shallow dip, water well and place in the greenhouse or conservatory until the plants have knitted together and the threat of frost has passed.




