By the time you read this article we will be well into autumn; 'the season of mists and mellow fruitfulness', that the poet John Keats wrote about. We will have celebrated our Harvest Festivals and as the days get shorter and the temperature drops, we may feel a little dispirited or downcast, yet autumn can be the most productive season of the year.

When we look at the beauty of the many trees around us and see the glorious reds, yellows, oranges and browns of their leaves, we can wonder at God's creation and reflect on the many things that nature can teach us. Let's just think about a tree for a moment – its trunk, its roots and its leaves and what happens to it in the autumn. The trunk stands firm drawing strength from its roots, but it is time to shed those leaves that have been so important to it earlier on in the year. But not one of those leaves is wasted, because they float to the ground to renourish the roots so that the tree can survive through the difficult times, to flourish again when the time is right.

I recently read a book by the Swedish author Margareta Magnusson about the tradition of Dostadning, called, 'The Gentle Art of Swedish Death Cleaning'. It is a beautiful book and by no means as morbid as it sounds. People are encouraged, on an annual basis, to look at the things that clutter up their lives, to think about those things that they do not need any more, to say 'thank you' to them for what they have meant in the past, and then to part with them. Just like the tree that sheds those unneeded leaves in autumn.

Perhaps we can think about this, not only in a physical sense, but in our spiritual lives as well; what clutters up our physical and spiritual life, and hinders us from growing closer to God, and to doing His will? In autumn, we are encouraged to let go of outdated beliefs, habits, resentments or attachments that weigh us down and hinder our spiritual growth. Psalm 51:10 encourages us to pray, 'Create in me a pure heart, O God and renew a steadfast spirit within me'.

May we always remember that God is good no matter what the season. He cares and provides for us, and we can trust that he will continue to do that. We may, or may not, have a new shepherd for our flock here in Winscombe, Sandford and Churchill by the time this article is published, but I encourage you to be faithful in praying that the Christian roots in our community may continue to flourish in the years to come.

Autumn is a time to draw strength from our own Christian roots, of simplifying our lives, of enjoying the moment of scrunching in the leaves as we walk forward on our Christian journeys. May we stand firm in our Christian faith whatever the future holds.



The Branch includes the area of Mendip from Nailsea in the north, south through Winscombe to Wedmore, and east from Winscombe along Mendip and Cheddar Valley through Cheddar, Priddy and Wells, to Shepton Mallet. The southern edge runs from Wedmore east to embrace Glastonbury and Street. Hence, the new name is a better definition of the area we cover.

AUGUST SHOUTS – PORTISHEAD CREW ESCORT YACHT TO HARBOUR


In August there were 19 'shouts' between our four Somerset Lifeboat Stations (Burnham-on-Sea – 1, Minehead – 9, Portishead – 5 and Weston-super-Mare – 4).



Portishead Lifeboat and crew launched on service on Wednesday 20th August at 4:00 pm, to assist a yacht which had been at sea for many hours and was suffering engine issues. The yacht's crew realised that they would have trouble entering Portishead Marina, so asked for assistance and the RNLI Portishead crew launched to assist.

The five crew on board the vessel were well equipped, wearing lifejackets and experienced sailors, but appeared to be

very tired after their long journey from Cornwall. After sailing all the way to Portishead Pier, they were taken under tow by the lifeboat crew and were pleased to be supported back to the safe haven of Portishead Marina.

Gardening Notes for October

Trees for Small Gardens

Trees are the most important plants in the world, without them we would not be here, they are the lungs of our planet, helping to turn carbon dioxide into oxygen that we can breathe. Every garden should have at least one tree, even if you have a small garden there are a variety of suitable trees. It is important to choose the right tree; one whose scale suits the garden and provides as much interest as possible throughout the year. It should have attractive structure and shape, autumn colour, perhaps blossom in the spring for pollinating insects, followed possibly by fruit.

You can buy trees as bare root plants (always supplied during the dormant season), or as a container grown plant. Bare root trees should be planted as promptly as possible providing the soil is not frozen, but if it is, wrap the roots in damp compost until weather conditions improve. Container trees can be planted at any time of the year, but ideally when they are likely to suffer the least stress, which is during late autumn or early spring.

Plant your tree when the weather is favourable. Prepare the planting area well and make sure the roots fit comfortably into the hole, as well as planting at the same depth as it was growing previously. It may be necessary to support the tree by staking using a short stake angled at 45 degrees and reaching a third of the way up the trunk.

Here are a few of the trees from the many available - all suitable if you have limited space:

Crab apples are a good choice for any small garden. The variety *Malus 'Hupehensis'* has dainty pink and white blossom in the spring followed by bright red fruit and is loved by birds. *Malus 'Golden Hornet'* or *'Evereste'* would also be ideal.

Sorbus 'Vilmorinii' is an unusual mountain ash with fine ferny leaves, turning to rich purple and crimson in autumn. Pretty umbels of flowers produce pink berries that eventually fade to white.



Cornus Kousa is a favourite small tree, especially in late spring when its branches are covered in creamy white bracts that turn pink as they age.

Amelanchier (also known as **Snowy Mespilus**), is a North American tree that carries white blooms on bare branches in spring and has vibrant golden foliage in autumn.

Acer Palatum 'Osakazuki' is a compact acer reaching no more than 4 metres and has the most intense and long-lasting red autumn colour of all the Japanese maples.

Magnolia Stillata produces a mass of stunning bright white star shaped flowers opening up from silky buds. Being a compact variety, this tree will reach a final height of just two metres.

Supporting and Protecting our Natural World

How Animals Heal Us

Here is a quote from Milan Kundera: 'Dogs are our link to Paradise. They don't know evil or jealousy or discontent. To sit on a hill with a dog, on a glorious afternoon, is to be back in Eden where doing nothing was not boring. It was Peace'.

I read this quote recently and gave it some thought. It is true, it's dogs in this case, but many other pets can also heal. On a basic level, dogs encourage physical activity and create a daily routine, especially for those of us who live alone. Caring for a pet gives a sense of purpose and responsibility. For example, they provide themselves, and us, with fun by playing games and giving a warm welcome when we return home.

There is more! Dogs can improve our mental health by providing companionship. Scientific research shows that with day-to-day interaction, a pet promotes mental health by releasing hormones from the brain that reduces anxiety, boosts our mood and reduces blood pressure. The main hormones are serotonin, oxytocin and dopamine that generally give you a good feeling, and one of safety.



Sometimes, it is impossible for people to keep dogs any longer because of age, illness or work demands. After my lovely Border Collie sisters died, I decided not to have another dog, but I was very willingly 'lent' another Border Collie, Sky. I walked with her, almost daily, for 12 years; she offered unconditional loyalty and companionship without ever being over fussy. In this photo she seems to say; "My eyes seem to talk. They are kind and gentle eyes, and I always concentrate on the people I am with and try

to understand them so that we work, play and relax together. My eyes may also persuade people to give me treats or throw a ball (my favourite)!"



If that doesn't happen, there's a website called; 'Borrow My Doggy' (www.borrowmydoggy.com) where, for a small fee, the company will send a list of dogs that are asking for a companion in your postcode area. In my area, there are currently 34 dogs asking to be 'borrowed'. It is up to the owner and possible borrower to make their own arrangements.

I think, however, that all the writing I have done could have been summed up in just this one picture! Rosie and Bonnie had never met. Rosie had never been close to another dog but, as you can see here, there is trust, warmth and comfort for both; she seems lost in her own world.

It is so important to return the unconditional trust given to us from pets, willingly and always.



SEPTEMBER EVENTS

RAFA-MSB held a Branch meeting on **Monday 1**st **September** in Wells Golf Club during which Dave Rogers, supported by his wife Julia, gave a presentation entitled; 'The History of the Royal Observer Corps'. The presentation covered the role of the police in WW1 as aircraft observers, which in 1925, led to the introduction of the 'Raid Reporting System', and also the formation of the 'Observer Corps'. During WW2, the 'Observer Corps' became an integral part of the 'Dowding Air Defence System' which in 1941, became the 'Royal Observer Corps' (ROC). The ROC continued in its primary role of aircraft recognition and reporting until 1955 when it was allocated the additional task of detecting and reporting nuclear explosions and associated fall-out. In 1965, the ROC lost its role in air defence and assumed the role of field force for the 'United Kingdom Warning and Monitoring Organisation' (UKWMO), which related to its nuclear reporting role, and this continued until the ROC was stood down in March 1996 at the end of the Cold War. Dave Rogers was an Observer Lieutenant based in Yeovil where he met his future wife who was also in the ROC. The meeting finished with Branch business and optional lunch and drinks from the golf club's menu and bar.

On **Sunday 14**th **September** at 11:00 am in St Michael's Roman Catholic Church, RAFA-MSB commemorated the 85th Anniversary of the Battle of Britain with a multi-denomination Battle of Britain service that remembered the activity, personnel and service of the RAF during WW2 and subsequent conflicts. The service was led by the Branch Chaplain, Reverend Colin Moore, and was attended by the Vice Lord Lieutenant of Somerset, the High Sherriff of Somerset, the Air Officer South West, the Mayor and Mayoress of Wells, Councillors from Shepton Mallet and Street, representatives from RAFA Yeovil Branch and Air Cadets from Shepton Mallet and Wells Squadrons. The Standards of RAFA Mid-Somerset and Yeovil branches and the two Air Cadet Squadrons were paraded. Due to the severe weather forecast, remembrance wreaths were laid at the church altar instead of at the Shepton Mallet Cenotaph.




Local History Corner

Number 24: Barton

Barton is on the outskirts of the Parish and has contributed to the local history of the area in a number of ways. The name itself is of obscure origin, although it almost certainly relates to an Old English word meaning 'barley', and thus refers to the once principal occupation in the area. There are still indications of mediaeval buildings in the locality; it is likely that a hamlet existed at Barton in Roman times. The trackway, along the crest of Wavering Down, was undoubtedly in use in pre-historic times and in the Roman period. A path certainly led from this trackway, through what is now Barton, to a harbour close to Yarberry. Earthworks and field boundaries recorded here in 2010/11*, indicate extensive activity which included a fort, two small fortlets and a mooring basin (measuring about 60m by 80m), adjacent to the river. This harbour was almost certainly connected to the Roman settlement below Wint Hill, by a waterway. Yarberry standing stone may well have been a marker for ships sailing between the harbour and the estuary.

Unfortunately, little documentary evidence seems to exist, but records show that John de Barton obtained a licence to build an oratory at Woodborough in 1353 and he also paid for a chaplain. This was after St James's Church had been built in 1236, and the first vicar appointed, nearly 800 years ago now in 1226. It is not known exactly where this would have been situated, but there is a



possibility that it was in fields on Woodborough Farm, once owned by the Dean and Chapter of Wells Cathedral, and known as Gilley Witches. 'Gilley' could be a corruption of 'St Giles', the patron saint of the disabled and beggars. This field is now beneath new housing.

Another connection between Barton and St. James's Church is the architect Sir George Oatley (1863 - 1950). For many years, he was a consultant architect to St. James's and lived at Barton Rocks (a house he designed), on the north side of Wavering Down, overlooking the Vale of Winscombe. He was responsible for many well-known local buildings, including Coombe Lodge (built on 18th century foundations for the Wills family), Wills Tower at Bristol University (for which he received his knighthood), and Bristol Royal Infirmary. He was the consultant architect to St James's Church until his death in 1950 and advised on a number of features in the church including the central heating system and the wooden floor.

Update from Tessa Munt, MP for Winscombe, Sandford & Churchill

I hope you've had a wonderful summer. My summer diary included visits to several excellent local charities and organisations, including Somerset's Armed Forces Cadets on camp in Hampshire, Prickles Hedgehog Rescue and the Wildlife Trust to learn about their restoration projects. There is so much going on and it's a real privilege to recognise publicly the efforts of those who volunteer, support and take responsibility, for so much activity locally.

I hosted my first 'youth' surgeries this summer and it was good to hear from young people about their hopes and concerns. It's likely that today's 12-year-olds and upwards, will be able to vote at the next General Election and it's interesting to know what the next generation really cares about.

Last month, I wrote about the Environment Agency's planned withdrawal of main river maintenance, and I've voiced my concerns about this, and the potential for flooding, very clear. I attended the South West Association of Drainage Authorities (SWADA) emergency meeting about the situation, and when Parliament returned at the beginning of September, I requested Ministerial intervention.

Locally, I enjoyed my visit to Mendip Vale Medical Group, visiting both their Langford Surgery and the building in Congresbury, and heard about their future plans. Further afield, I met specialists at the Royal Marsden Hospital working with the latest radiotherapy machines – amazing! I've pressed the government for years on updating NHS machines. I was also interviewed by Channel 4 News on research into the condition ME, on which I continue to campaign.







absolutely It an was excellent programme, and everyone had a great evening with over £800 being raised towards church funds. A huge thank you to everyone supported who this wonderful event.







For or Against: Slavery and Salvation



Much of our world operates around the challenge to be 'for' or 'against'. And generally, it is easier to be 'against' things than 'for' them! Look at the tendencies of the media, politics and religious disputes.

On Anti-Slavery Day on the 18th October, people across the UK will recommit themselves to the fight against modern slavery and human trafficking; one of the great evils of our time. Like William Wilberforce and what we now call historic slavery, we need to fight against the oppression and exploitation of our sisters and brothers today. Abolition is the proper aim of being anti or against.

And the challenge is growing with:

- More vulnerable people, susceptible to false promises
- Increasingly flexible working arrangements which give space for criminal agencies to provide goods and services based on exploitation and slave labour
- Police and prevention sources being forever overstretched
- Our own insatiable appetite for cheap products.

There is much we need to learn to oppose and abolish. But, in facing these almost overwhelming challenges, we must not neglect what is primary for our Christian witness, the call to notice, reach out, rescue and restore. The call to love, to be for those who are hidden, neglected, hurting and ignored.

During Anti-Slavery Week, give time to think how you, or your church or home group could better learn how to contribute to the fight against modern slavery. The Clewer Initiative has some amazing resources to help us open our eyes, assist the authorities, and reach out towards victims.

But, alongside these prayers and practices, consider how you could go the extra mile in the way of the Good Samaritan. Going beyond the indifference of the Priest and the Levite, too busy to stop, notice, reach out, rescue; rather how can we better contribute to establishing systems like the partnership between the Good Samaritan and the innkeeper? Systems to provide care and the basis of restoring proper health and opportunities to those whose cries represent the voice of Jesus, for those willing to listen.

Be against modern slavery this October, but more, be for those who need our friendship and our partnership.

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

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
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
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Avoiding Court Disputes over your Will

Roughly one in five families have disputes about inheritance, estimates suggest. Each year, approximately 10,000 people dispute Wills across England and Wales.

With court disputes over Wills becoming increasingly common, how can you reduce the risk of legal battles over your Will?

Disputes over Wills typically occur when Executors – the individuals responsible for managing the Estate – fail to fulfil their duties properly. Missteps such as unequal asset distribution, favouring certain beneficiaries, or neglecting the terms of the Will can lead to legal challenges.

Executors play a crucial role in ensuring that the deceased's wishes are carried out. However, when they act improperly or irresponsibly, beneficiaries may feel compelled to pursue legal action. Steps to Minimise Will Disputes

Understand Your Family dynamics - it is helpful to have a clear picture of the relationships involved. This helps to identify possible areas of contention such as if someone is being excluded.

Choose the Right Executor(s) - many court disputes stem from Executors failing to act responsibly. Select the right person for this role to ensure your estate is managed fairly & efficiently. Key considerations include their trustworthiness, capability as well as their location and age.

Write a Clear, Detailed Will - Wills that are not specific can cause of disputes. A well-drafted Will leaves no room for misinterpretation. Include specific instructions regarding: distribution of assets, the roles & responsibilities of Executors & provisions for any excluded family members. Clarity is key. By explicitly stating your intentions, you reduce the chances of mistakes that could lead to legal challenges.
