

As I prepare to leave this parish, the story that has been returning to me again and again, is the story of the Exodus. For those who may not know the biblical reference, Exodus is the Old Testament account of God leading the people of Israel out of slavery in Egypt, through the wilderness and towards a new future in the promised land. It is a story about leaving, about trusting God in times of change, and about hope unfolding step by step.

It might seem an unusual choice for February, when the days are still short and the fields still look more brown than green, yet Exodus is not only a story of departure, it is also a story of promise, of God at work in the space between what has been and what is yet to come. That makes it feel very fitting for both this season and this moment of my farewell.

The people of Israel did not leave Egypt because everything was neatly tied up. They left because God called them onward. They stepped out into uncertainty, trusting that the God who had been with them in slavery would also be with them on the road ahead. Exodus reminds us that faith is often lived in the middle, between the familiar and the new, between comfort and hope.

As a curate, I arrived here in July 2022 with much to learn, and I have learned it in church services and social encounters, at gravesides and moments of quiet grief, as well as times of joy filled weddings and baptisms. Like the Israelites setting out with what they could carry, I take with me many memories, lessons and friendships that I will treasure. I am deeply grateful for your patience, encouragement and generosity along the way.

February also brings the first hopeful signs of spring. Snowdrops appear, not because winter has gone, but because new life insists on pushing through. Spring comes gently in small hints and promises. Exodus is like that too, the promised land was not reached overnight, but God was present in daily bread, guidance and unexpected provision along the way.

It's a particular joy to know that this benefice is beginning its next season with the recent arrival of your new vicar, Revd Dr Julian Davies. I leave knowing that you are in good hands, and I hope Julian's ministry among you will be marked by laughter as well as prayer, by good cups of tea and plenty of cake!

So, this is not simply goodbye, but a cheerful blessing for the journey ahead. May this season of early spring be full of growth, kindness, and the occasional surprise. May your parish life continue to flourish, and may God lead you forward with hope, joy, and a smile. Wherever the road leads next, for me, and for you, may we walk it knowing that the God of Exodus still goes before us.

WORLD DAY OF PRAYER 2026

“I will give you rest, come”

Matthew 11: 28-30

Friday 6th March 2026

The World Day of Prayer is an international, women-led, ecumenical movement that shares the hopes, concerns, and prayers of women from around the globe. This year, the women of Nigeria have created a service that speaks to our need for peace and solace, drawing on their faith and experiences, in a world filled with struggles and anxieties. We give thanks to the Christian women of Nigeria for this service and pray that their stories will encourage and inspire women throughout the world to unite as one people in both prayer and action.

This year's artwork has been created by Gift Amarachi Ottah, a final-year Mass Communication student at Alex Ekwueme Federal University, Ndifur-Alike in Ebonyi State, and draws inspiration from her home state of Abia in Nigeria.

Gift's artwork depicts the daily reality of rural Nigerian women whose lives are marked by endless labour from sunrise to sunset. These women traverse treacherous paths to their farms, often carrying both their harvest and their children – a toddler strapped to their back, a heavy load balanced on their head while guiding other children along unmaintained roads through thick bush.



The artwork also shows three women sitting together, their different traditional attire representing Nigeria's diverse cultures. Though they come from different ethnic groups, their shared experiences unite them. To meet their basic survival needs, these women carry burdens and traumas that are physical, emotional and spiritual.

Yet these burdens become bearable when we respond to Jesus' invitation to come and find rest in him. When we bring our weariness to Christ and support one another in community, we find rest and strength to continue our journey.

We would like to let customers know that as from **Monday 16th February 2026**, Winscombe Post Office will be reducing its opening hours to **four mornings a week**:

Monday: 9 am – 1 pm
Tuesday: 9 am – 1 pm
Thursday: 9 am – 1 pm
Friday: 9 am – 1 pm

This decision hasn't been taken lightly. Over the past couple of years, we have reduced our hours slightly and have been trying to sell the business, but without success. As time has gone on, we have found the current hours increasingly difficult to sustain.

Rather than close the Post Office altogether, and lose this valued village service, we felt that reducing our hours further was the best way to keep the Post Office open and continue serving the community for the foreseeable future.

We know how important the Post Office is to many people in Winscombe, and we have carefully considered the impact this change may have. We hope the revised hours will continue to provide a reliable and accessible service, particularly for those who depend on it locally.

We would like to take this opportunity to sincerely thank everyone for their continued support, kindness and understanding. We are very grateful to be part of the Winscombe community and hope you will continue to support the Post Office under the new opening hours.



At 8 o'clock on Christmas Eve, a record number of over one hundred people gathered at All Saints for the Village Carol Service. There was 'no room at the Inn' only standing room; the service was taken by Reverend Ann Ogram.



The Sandford Handbell Ringers played at the beginning and end of the service. After the welcome, the service began with Churchwarden Simon Crew lighting the four red candles on the beautiful Advent Wreath, representing Hope, Peace, Joy and Love.



The service contained seven well known carols and also included readings covering the prophesy of the Messiah's birth, the Angel Gabriel visiting Mary, the birth of Jesus Christ, and the shepherds going to the manger. Ann read the Christmas Gospel John 1:1-14, The Word of Life, and gave a short reflection on this Gospel reading. Also included were the poems 'BC:AD', by U A Fanthorpe, and 'The Gift' by Judith Searle, and a Christmas paraphrase of 1 Corinthians 13.

After the Christmas Prayer and the carol, 'O Come, All Ye Faithful', we fast forwarded to Christmas Day, by lighting the centre candle in the wreath to celebrate the birth of Jesus. A young girl and her mother laid the baby Lord Jesus in the crib at the foot of the Christmas tree.

The congregation then joined in the blessing:

May the humility of the shepherds, the faith of the wise men, the joy of the angels and the peace of the Christ Child, be God's gift to us, and to everyone, this Christmas and always. Amen.

The Ornamental Garden

Any congested clumps of **snowdrops** can be lifted and divided up now while they are still in the green; replant them at their original depth.



If you have not already done so, remove leaves from **hellebores**, cutting them back to ground level. This will not only expose the flowers to their best advantage but also reduce the risk of the plants becoming infected with any fungal disease. New foliage will be produced soon after flowering.

Any dead foliage or flowering spikes can be cut back to ground level to allow bulbs to emerge and manifest themselves. The only plants to leave at the moment are **penstemons** (as they still need protection from frost), and the spent flowering heads of **hydrangeas** which should be left until late March or April.

Final pruning can be carried out during February while the bare branches reveal the structure of the plant and before new shoots start to emerge in March. Pruning enables you to maintain the shape of the plant and induce it to produce new more vigorous shoots. Plants suitable for pruning at this time of the year, are those that form their buds on new growth and flower in the second half of the year. Spring and early flowering shrubs should be pruned after flowering.

Clematis that flower in the first half of the year, should be lightly pruned, and those that flower later in the year, cut back to 15-30cm from the ground. After pruning, apply a mulch of well-rotted manure or garden compost.

Buddleja, Sambucus and **Fuchsia** can all be cut back hard now, the harder they are cut back the more they will flower.



Cornus, which are grown for their coloured stems during winter, can also be cut back hard, although it's better to only remove the older stems and reduce the plant by 25%.

There is no mystery to pruning **roses** as there is little you can do from which they will not recover. Firstly, remove all damaged and crossing stems, then cut back hard any stems which are too weak to carry flowers. Finally, remove any old stems that are crowding the plant. Most shrub roses do not need any other pruning, but they can be reduced by a third by clipping evenly. Hybrid Teas, Floribundas and China roses, need to have all their remaining healthy shoots cut back by two-thirds.

Apply a mulch of well-rotted manure or garden compost to the borders, this will help to suppress weeds and conserve moisture, as well as providing nutrients to the plants.

Supporting and Protecting Our Natural World

Who was Ratty?

Every so often my cat, Pandi, proudly deposits a dead vole on the porch floor. She seems to find them quickly and easily from the nearby garden, and yet I have never seen a live vole. I was therefore surprised to read that the most common mammal in the UK is the field vole. There are at least 75 million of them, more than the human population!

Field voles are diminutive, with grey/brown fur above and pale grey underneath, with a short stumpy tail (so not a mouse). Voles like to keep a low profile, moving along the ground through a network of well-used runs in long grass that eventually lead to their underground tunnels and dens.

Field voles are extremely elusive, living quiet lives, mainly underground in a family colony of perhaps 2 adults, juveniles and a nest of babies.

They are highly predated; an important food source for others such as foxes, stoats, weasels, shrews, cats(!), plus birds of prey, particularly owls and kestrels.


Despite massive predation field voles are not a protected species; the UK Red List describes them as of 'least concern.' A licence is not even needed to trap them. To maintain their numbers, voles are active by day and night. They do not hibernate and may produce 3 to 6 litters of up to 7 young annually, plus undergo a population boom every four years. Their lives consequently are very short perhaps only 2 to 6 months but there is constant replacement.



There are 2 other species of native vole in the UK - the bank and water vole, both are tiny and peaceful.

By contrast, the water vole is critically endangered, having suffered a population decline of 90% since the 1970s caused by loss of habitat and huge predation by American farmed mink, that have either escaped or been deliberately released from fur farms by activists. These deliberate releases highlight a conflict between animal welfare concerns for farmed mink, and conservation efforts to protect native species from escaped mink, that can easily enter water vole burrows and take both adults and young.

Now efforts are happening to help endangered voles. Conservation focuses on tackling their main threats using strategies like **habitat restoration** (improving riverbanks for burrows and cover); extensive **American mink control** via smart rafts (baited cages trap mink which are then taken away and humanely killed); releases from **captive breeding schemes** plus **public involvement** in surveys, sightings and land management, all coordinated by wildlife trusts and other national bodies.



Being so elusive there is little folklore and few stories about voles.

The Wind in the Willows by Kenneth Grahame, is the beloved story of four characters - Mole, Ratty, Toad and Badger. Ratty is really a water vole! He is highly respected, modest and ready to help.

As in real life, when voles do appear in fiction, they often represent humility, community, family life and resilience.



Brief Encounter!

Sitting in our local café the other day, a couple were at the next table with a very young baby who was just beginning to take in the world around him, (or possibly her), and we couldn't help but wonder what life had in store.

Throughout January, we have been marking the **Epiphany**, not a single Sunday, nor a hangover from Christmas, but a season of readings recounting some key events in Christ's life. It started with arrival of The Wise Men, not kings, number unknown and from somewhere vaguely described as '*The East*'. Originally, this was not part of Epiphany! Fast forward thirty years and we read about Jesus' baptism in the River Jordan, the calling of his first disciples, and the first miracle he performed at a wedding in Cana of Galilee. The Epiphany is really all about the manifestation or revelation of the adult Jesus as the Christ.


Finally, we return in our readings to the time of Mary and Joseph's visit to The Temple with the baby Jesus. According to Hebrew law, the first-born male belonged to God and they could reclaim him 31 days after his birth by making an appropriate sacrifice to God in the Temple. Furthermore, child birth was deemed to render a woman ritually unclean, so Mary must present herself to a priest in the Temple on the 40th day after giving birth, for ritual purification. Only then can she return to sit with the women in the synagogue.

Having satisfied all the law's requirements, the couple are about to return home when suddenly a very old man called Simeon comes up to them and takes the baby Jesus from their arms, praising God with those now immortal words for Christians; '*Lord now let me depart in peace for my eyes have seen your salvation which you have prepared before the face of all people to be a light for a revelation to the gentiles and for the glory of your people Israel.*'

Simeon had been a faithful Jew all his life but must have found it very hard living under the Roman occupation, governed by a cruel and paranoid king, and subject to a priesthood who were obsessed with rules and regulations rather than the spiritual welfare of their people. There had been talk of a leader, a kind of second Judas Maccabees, who would rise up and overthrow their enemies, but this was not going to happen. Simeon was now too old to do anything but pray and watch, so it will be for the future generation - suddenly he sees the baby and realizes this is what God has planned and all will be well!

When I feel despondent about the state of our present world, the sight of a new-born or very young child, makes me realise there is always hope for the future, not in the way Simeon did, but nonetheless hope, and I secretly offer a prayer for that child.
